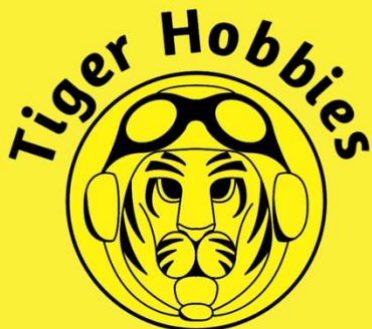

Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen, welcome to The SALUS Stadium for this afternoon's Isuzu FA Vase First Qualifying Round game against Maghull. We give a warm welcome to Maghull's players, officials and supporters and hope they have a safe trip home after the game.

This afternoon's visitors, Maghull, hail from just north of Liverpool and ply their trade in the North West Counties Football League First Division (step 6). Maghull currently sit in 1st place on goal difference with 10 points after 4 games. Maghull's recent form has seen them go unbeaten in the league so far in 2025/26. Starting the season with a 2-2 draw at home with Squires Gate, they have won their last 3, beating Droylsden 4-3 at home, Blackpool AFC 2-1 away and then, last Saturday, they trounced Nelson 5-1 on Maghull's home ground, Old Hall Lane.

The Blues come into today's game in 9th place on 6 points after 4 games. Our opening games of 25/26 have seen us win 2 and lose 3 in all competitions. Goals from Luis Afonso Ferreira and Tom Alngohuru gave us all 3 points on opening day as we downed visitors Albion Sports by 2 goals to 1. Then 2 losses by the only goal of the game followed at Brighthouse Town in the FA Cup and at Barton Town. Last weekend, we reversed the trend when Luis Afonso Ferreira's wonder goal gave us all 3 points



against Thackley, here at The Wezzie. But in midweek, it was a controversial 'wonder why it was given goal' that sent us to another 1-0 away defeat at the hands of Bottesford.

We have never previously played Maghull in a competitive, or otherwise, fixture.

Both clubs were eliminated in their first FA Vase games of 2024/25, Maghull in the first qualifying round and Frickley in the second qualifying round, having received a bye in the first. There are currently no replays in

the FA Vase and if the game is drawn after 90 minutes it will go straight to a penalty shootout, as it did here (unsuccessfully for us) at The Wezzie last season against Sandbach United. Whichever side does progress to the next round of the competition will face the winner of the tie between Northwich Victoria or Winterton Rangers at home on the weekend of Saturday 20th September.

Expect a good old fashioned English cup tie as both sides look to get one step closer to the Wembley Arch!

The Blues are next in action here at Westfield Lane on Wednesday 26th August, 7.45pm ko, as we get back to the day to day business of the NCEL. We hope to see you all there.

Enjoy the game and as always we thank you for your valued and continued support.

Meet The Visitors

Situated 8 miles north of Liverpool on the main Preston Road, what is now the A59, Maghull Football Club was founded in 1921. The club initially played a series of friendly fixtures before joining the I Zingari Alliance League in season 1922/23, starting an allegiance to I Zingari football on Merseyside which was to go unbroken until 1960. During this period, Maghull won the league championship and cup on occasion. When the club reluctantly resigned from the I Zingari League, they successfully applied to join the Liverpool County Combination, another league which they have also topped. In 1972, Maghull joined the Lancashire Combination, where they won the league's challenge cup.

Then 6 years later they moved to the Cheshire County League. During this time they reached the third round of the FA Vase.

In 1982, the Lancashire Combination and Cheshire County League amalgamated to form the North West Counties League, with Maghull being one of the founder members.

They settled into the now defunct Division Three, where they finished mid table in their first season. After finishing 3rd in the 1985/86 season, missing out on promotion by 1 point, Maghull, alongside all of their other running buddies from the 1986/87 campaign, were promoted to the second division by default, given that Division Three was to be disbanded ahead of 1987/88. Again, Maghull finished 3rd.

In Division Two, Maghull strung together a series of mostly tophalf finishes before 1992/93. It was in 1992/93 that the club claimed the Division Two title. However, ground grading issues meant that it was Bootle who got the nod for promotion instead of the league champions.

With that, Maghull kept on achieving top half finishes in the division two table, right up until the 1998/99 campaign. It was this season that would be Maghull's last in the NWCFL until last season. Ground grading again play its part in the club's departure from the division, and they found a new home in the West Cheshire League.

In the 2006/07 season, Maghull came 2nd, repeated that feat in 2010/11, and finally got their hands on another league title in the 2013/14 season, winning the West Cheshire League.

Other silverware won in the club's 100-plus years of existence includes the Liverpool County

Amateur Cup, Liverpool County Challenge Cup, Lancashire Amateur Cup, Pyke Cup and the Howarth and Gallagher Bowl.

Maghull remained in the West Cheshire League until the 2023/2024 season, when they were promoted to the North West Counties League First Division North. Despite finishing 9 points behind champions Mossley Hill Athletic, they did enough in their application to-re enter the NWCFL.

Maghull finished their first season back in the NWCL in a respectable 10th place. Victories over Droylsden, Darwen and a 7-1 home win against local rivals Skelmersdale United were memorable moments during the 2024/25 season.

Maghull originally played their home games at Boyer Fields before changing their ground in 1928 to Pimbley Playing Fields which was sited off Deyes Lane, just a mile away from their existing Old Hall ground in Hall Lane where they took up occupancy in 1954.

Following a fire in 1991, which destroyed their dressing rooms and clubhouse, Maghull erected a new building, which houses dressing rooms and a bar.

In the build up to the club's centenary, the clubhouse bar and lounge area had an extensive modern refit ready to take the club into it's next chapter.

Maghull FC is currently run by an active and extensive committee of volunteers, many of whom are ex-players and ex-managers of the club. And 5 of the committee members have been honoured by the FA, in recognition to their services to the club and the wider Football Community, having served football for over 50 years.

Maghull FC continues to be a community-focused football club with teams for youth, women, and inclusive players, and have proved that by sticking together and working hard great things can be achieved.





Frickley's History

Frickley Athletic FC is based in the former coal mining village of South Elmsall. Recent research has shown that the first South Elmsall football team was formed in 1905 but was superseded in 1908 by the newly formed Frickley Colliery Athletic Club and joined the South Yorkshire league which comprised of works, church and village teams. In 1910, the football club moved to the Sheffield Association League and first played in the FA Cup.

The club remained in the Sheffield Association League (except for the war years) until 1922, finishing runners up in 1911/12, and winners in 1920/21, our only ever league title.

In 1922/23 Frickley joined the Yorkshire league and after finishing runners up in 1923/24, the club were elected into the Midland League. Although the club had to apply for re election several times pre war (and didn't play in any league in 1933/34) it was kept going by the support of the mineworkers and the sale of players.

1936/37 was Frickley's worst ever league season when the club finished bottom with only 8 points, but amazingly reached the FA Cup 1st round proper for the first time.

Post war, Frickley remained in the Midland league gaining its best finish, 7th, in 1945/46, but left the league on its break up at the end of 1959/60.

From 1960/61 to 1969/70, Frickley Colliery played in the Cheshire County League. However, financial considerations led the club to join the Midland Counties League for 1970/71. They finished runners up in 1972/73, and were eventually elected into the NPL for the 1976/77 season as Frickley Athletic.

After finishing 3rd in 1979/80, the club was promoted into the Alliance Premier League, now the National League. Here they remained for 7 years, the most successful in the club's history, and in 1985/86 reached the FA Cup 3rd round proper, after beating a Football League club, Hartlepool Utd, only to lose 3-1 at home to Rotherham Utd. The club also finished as Gola League runners up. The following season saw a reversal as we were relegated back to the NPL. From 1987/88 to 1991/92 the club consistently finished around mid-table in the NPL, but did manage to reach the league cup final in 1991/92, losing 1-0 to Marine at Maine Road.

The next few seasons saw Frickley finish in the lower reaches of the table. Then, in 2005/06 The

Blues had their best league season for 20 years, finishing 2nd to Blyth Spartans. Unfortunately, the Blues lost on penalties in the playoff semi.

In the following seasons Frickley returned to the lower half of the table, but 2015/16 saw the club have a great season to finish 7th.

This was not repeated in 2016/17 as most of the players who had brought this success were attracted to join more affluent clubs. The club were relegated from the NPL Premier Division after being members for 30 years.

2017/18 saw the club enter the NPL Division 1 South, finishing 3rd in the league, scoring a record 117 goals. Additionally, Jacob Hazel broke the club record for individual goals in a season with 47 strikes. The season ended disappointingly with playoff semi final defeat at the hands of Stamford.

2018/19, in the new NPL East Division, was less successful, seeing managerial changes and a 12th place finish. However, the season had its highlights, with victory at highflying Morpeth and a 10-1 win over Liversedge in the FA Cup.

More change followed prior to the start of 2019/20. A further league reorganisation which put the Blues into the NPL South East Division was accompanied by a new manager. An inauspicious start led to the appointment of Dave Frecklington in September 2019.

Frecks rapidly turned the side's fortunes around, before lockdown ended the season. 2020/21 ultimately suffered the same fate.

Frecks built what looked like strong squad for the 2021/22 season, able to compete for promotion from the newly formed NPL East Division.

However, things didn't pan out the way that was hoped. Key departures led to a run of form that saw the club relegated to the Northern Counties East League for the first time in our history.

In the summer of 2022, former Blue, Wayne Benn, was appointed as manager, with ex-Frickley goal scoring legend Andy Hayward as his assistant. There were occasional highs but Benn resigned in early 2023 so Patrick McGuire came in to avoid a second successive relegation.

2023/24 started well, and included an 8-0 win at Goole, but ended with the release of McGuire. James Baxendale was in the hot seat for the start of 2024/25 but left in October.

Tom Claisse took the reins in November 2024 and successfully avoided

relegation. Tom and his team will be looking to bring back winning ways to Westfield Lane in 25/26.





The FA Vase Explained

The FA Vase effectively replaced The FA Amateur Cup in 1974. In that year The FA Council had decided to abolish the official distinction between amateur and professional footballers and this meant the end of The Amateur Cup and Amateur Internationals.

In its first season 220 clubs entered, but they did not include those that had dominated in The Amateur Cup. Enfield, Hendon, Dagenham, Skelmersdale United and others at their level were immediately allocated to The FA Trophy. For the first time in history, small clubs - even village clubs - had the chance of playing in a national final at Wembley.

The first Vase finalists were Hoddesdon Town from the Spartan League and Epsom & Ewell from the Surrey Senior League. The Hertfordshire side edged home 2-1 before a crowd of 9,000.

Even a competition as democratic as The Vase had its elite clubs in the early years.

Billericay Town, initially of the Essex Senior League, won it three times in four seasons. Halesowen Town, then in the West Midlands Regional League, appeared in three Finals and were successful in two. They even beat a Southall side that had a young Les Ferdinand leading the attack.

Until the new Wembley opened in 2007 the record attendance for a Vase Final was the 26,489 who saw the drawn 1989 Final between Sudbury Town and Tamworth at the old Wembley.

Tamworth won the replay 3-0 at Peterborough and Ian Moores, a former First Division player with Tottenham Hotspur, scored one of the goals. The FA Vase competition is in its 51st season in 2024/25. Wembley (old and new) has hosted the vast majority of the finals, Villa Park and St Andrews two each, Upton Park, White Hart Lane, The City Ground, Elland Road and London Road one each (including replays). 40 different clubs have got their hands on The Vase, donated by former FA Councillor Frank Adams. Whitley Bay lead the way with four wins.

Aficionados of The Vase competition tend to rate the 1992 Final between Wimborne Town and Guiseley as the best so far. Wessex League Wimborne had a modest record in the competition before then, having never ventured beyond the third round, but they embarked on a spectacular

journey that took them all the way to the Final. A goal down after 14 minutes at Wembley, the Dorset side fought back to win 5-3.

When The Vase Final returned to Wembley, a record 36,232 fans saw Truro City beat AFC Totton 3-1. Whitley Bay, the 2002 winners, achieved a sensational hat-trick of Final victories from 2009 to 2011.

The Northern League's dominance continued for two more seasons, with success for Dunston UTS and Spennymoor Town before Sholing, then Wessex League champions, got their name engraved on the trophy in 2014. The Northern League monopoly recommenced when North Shields won in 2015.

In 2015/16 Wembley Stadium staged the first Non-League Finals Day, which saw both the Vase and the Trophy decided back-to-back in front of almost 47,000 fans. Morpeth Town came from behind to stun Hereford 4-1 with 45-year-old Chris Swales on the scoresheet to win the Vase

with a third different club (Bridlington Town in 1993 and Dunston in 2012 were the other two).

South Shields and Hebburn have also won the competition since then, whilst being members of the Northern League.

The Vase continues to be a stepping stone to higher things as many recent winners have been promoted to step 4.

In 2017 Forest Green Rovers became the first FA Vase winners to go on to play in the English Football League, while one

former Football League team (Glossop North End) have been beaten finalists. In 2019 AFC Fylde (formerly known as Kirkham & Wesham) became the first team to have won both the FA Trophy and FA Vase. And records continue to be broken. In September 2021 Hinckley AFC set a new record score in the competition, beating St Martins 18-0.

The Vase is currently held by Whitstable Town, who beat AFC Whyteleafe 2-1 after extra time in the 2025 final.

Frickley & Maghull: FA Vase Histories

Maghull FC have a long and varied history in the FA Vase, stretching back to their debut in the 1980/81 season. They marked their first appearance in the competition with a 3-2 Preliminary Round home win over Blackpool Rangers before narrowly exiting in the First Round proper with a 3-2 defeat away to Clitheroe.

The club's best run came the following season, 1981/82, when they advanced to the Third Round proper. That campaign saw Maghull overcome HB & H Newton, then edge past Brook Sports after a replay, and do the same again against Hoylake Athletic, whom they held to a draw before winning replay 2-0. Interestingly, both games were played at Maghull as the initial tie was played there due to the unavailability of Hoylake's ground. Their progress was eventually halted by Irlam Town in a 2-0 away defeat.

Throughout the 1980s and early 1990s, Maghull were regular participants in the Vase and consistently progressed through the early rounds. Notable wins during this period included a 5-1 away victory at Westhoughton Town in 1990/91 and a 3-1 win over Blackpool Mechanics in 1992/93. They also had the upper hand in a handful of replays, including a 3-1 win away at General Chemicals and a 2-1 home victory over Garforth Town, then of the NCEL, during the 1993/94 competition. The club had several recurring opponents during their Vase campaigns, most notably Chadderton, whom they faced three times and defeated twice, including a 4-4 away draw followed by a 2-0 home replay win in 1983/84. After a long absence from the competition, Maghull returned to the FA Vase in the 2024/25 season. Unfortunately, their comeback ended at the First Qualifying Round stage with a 3-1 home defeat against Bury.



In total, Maghull have entered the FA Vase on 18 occasions prior to this season. While deep runs have been rare, the club has produced several memorable performances and maintained a competitive presence, especially during the 1980s and early 1990s.

In contrast, Frickley are rather newer to the FA Vase. Since joining the Vase in 2022/23, Frickley Athletic have made three appearances.

In their debut campaign of 2022/23 they progressed through two qualifying rounds. The club's bow in the competition was marked by an exciting 4-2 away win at Chadderton. The Blues looked to be cruising at 2-0 up, courtesy

of a brace from Al Keita, but then the hosts pulled it level with 2 goals in 2 minutes. It was a just a wobble as Matty Hughes and The Colonel, Richard Collier, netted in the last 10 minutes to seal it in Frickley's favour.

This was followed by a 2-1 home victory over Irlam, with first half goals Keita and Keenan Grist enough to see off the Manchester side.

The Blues exited at the First Round proper stage, falling to a

3-1 home defeat to Emley, with Keita getting a third goal of the season in the Vase. Big Al is pictured battling for the ball during this game. This remains Frickley's best performance to date in the FA Vase.

In the 2023/24 season, the campaign ended at the first hurdle with a surprising 2-1 home defeat to Barnton in the First Qualifying Round. A Keegan Townrow goal put The Blues a goal up for almost an hour but a collapse that saw Barnton score twice in time added on to shock Frickley.

Frickley received a bye to the Second Qualifying Round last season, 2024/25, but were held to a 2-2 home draw with Sandbach United. Rob Guilfoyle's penalty and a Jamie Tomlinson strike put The Blues ahead until a late spot kick levelled it for the visitors. Sandbach United went on to take the tie 5-4 on penalties.

Best showing in years

FRICKLEY Athletic gave one of their finest performances for many years when they conquered Whitby Town 3-0 in the opening Unibond Premier Division game at South Elmsall last Tuesday.

Leroy Chambers won a ball on the right in the seventh minute and whipped in a low cross for Ashley Scothern to steer it in at the far post and give the Blues an early advantage. While Gary Ingham had to make a smart save to hold a header from Graham Robinson five minutes later, little was seen of the Whitby attack and Frickley stretched the visiting cover, Lee Pugh shaving an upright with a 25 yard drive in the 34th minute.

Town keeper Ben Escritt went full stretch to save a shot from Calum Selby straight after the

interval, and also foiled Martyn Woolford with a fine save before being beaten in the 54th minute.

Escritt could only parry a cross by Woolford, Alex Callery drilling in the rebound from an angle, and Callery was on target again six minutes later when Chambers picked him out with another pinpoint cross from the left.

Scothern had a shot turned off target by the Whitby keeper in the 63rd minute before the visitors reverted to a 3-4-3 formation, which saw Ingham tested by David Wells and Scott Nicholson although Frickley still had the edge.

In the 85th minute, Scothern flicked on to Woolford whose cross produced a glancing header by Pugh which was superbly turned round a post by Escritt.

Triple blow for Trinity

ANOTHER polished performance by Frickley Athletic earned them a 3-0 victory when they entertained Gainsborough Trinity in the Unibond Premier Division last Wednesday.

The Blues moulded together well and soon threatened, Viv Rayson beating two men on the left in the 13th minute and hitting a low cross which Kevin Kelly stabbed into the side netting at the far post.

Trinity responded five minutes later when a free kick found Gary Castledine in space and he put in a low ball which former Frickley player Colin Bishop struck wide from six yards. The Blues went ahead in the 34th minute, visiting keeper James Holmshaw punching away a shot by Ian Thompson only

to be beaten by a Simon Fuller volley from the rebound.

The second half saw the home side maintain control and they improved their advantage after 54 minutes when a cross by Gary Hatto was only half-cleared and Adrian Wells rifled the ball in from 15 yards.

Jason Kabia managed to lose his marker on the hour but saw his shot well saved by Ian Taylor. Rayson caused the Trinity cover problems with some lively runs, and he pounced on a mishit clearance in the 81st minute before showing a clean pair of heels to two defenders and drilling a shot past Holmshaw on the run. Rayson again got clear three minutes later but screwed his shot wide, although the spoils were already assured.

NCEL News

Four Macron NCEL sides made it through to First Round Qualifying in this season's Emirates FA Cup following the week's Preliminary Round action. Wombwell Town were 2-1 victors at home to league rivals Parkgate to book their place at the next stage with strikes from Jordan Kershaw and Jack Steers sealing the deal although Alex Wonham halved the deficit towards the start of the second period. Jack McMenemy's first half penalty and a 74th minute goal from Jake Brown secured Bottesford Town a win by the same scoreline at Daventry Town. And, Rossington Main progressed with a 3-2 home win over Newark Town, Elliott Andrew with an 85th minute decider following earlier goals from Dylan Mantle and Paul Sherburn.

Pickering Town, meanwhile, had to go to a replay after a goalless draw at home to Easington Colliery. There were defeats, however, for Barton Town who lost 6-1 at home to Carlton Town, and for Sheffield and Campion who both went down 3-0 at home to Bootle and at Trafford, respectively.

In the Premier Division, Penistone Church replaced Tadcaster Albion at the summit by beating them 2-1 at the Parker Roofing Memorial Ground. Lennon O'Grady gave the hosts a 34th minute lead for the hosts and doubled their advantage through Jordan Coduri and then Robert Guilfoyle pulled one back. Liversedge are up into third following their 2-0 home victory over Eccleshill United, Malakai Philip and Antony Brown with the goals. And Handsworth complete the top six after their 1-0 win at Golcar United. Scott Ruthven scoring the only goal. Armthorpe Welfare are the new leaders of Division One as a 4-0 victory at Goole kept up their perfect start to the campaign, Michael Dunn, Thomas Joynt, Alfie Charlotte and Harry Charlotte were the scorers. Jamie Austin and Atley Jackson netted for Dearne & District as they won 2-1 at Leeds UFCA to climb into second, Omar Sanyang scored for the home side. Club Thorne Colliery are up into fourth as they picked up a point in a 1-1 draw at Doncaster City, Luke Williams' penalty restoring parity after Mason Barlow had given the hosts a 54th minute lead. They leapfrog South Leeds who were beaten 3-2 at Worsbrough Bridge in one of the two games played on Friday night, Mitchell Hamilton's penalty and a Dyllan Drovi strike twice putting them ahead. And, it was honours even between hosts Selby Town and Nostell Miners Welfare with a 1-1 draw, Caden McGrath equalising for the Robins after Jack Maeer had given the away side a first half lead.

In the midweek games, Pickering Town booked their place in the next round of the FA Cup after an away win in their replay. The Pikes travelled to Easington Colliery and won 2-0 with goals from George Brown and Souleymane Coulibaly. Their reward is a home game against Redcar Athletic.

The rest of the midweek's focus was on the Premier Division with nine games taking place as Tadcaster Albion returned to the summit with a 3-0 home victory over Horbury Town. Oliver Green's hat-trick secured the points for the Brewers to overtake Penistone Church who drew 1-1 with visitors Rossington, Samuel Scrivens got the equaliser after Will Sutton opened the scoring in the 77th minute. Liversedge stay in third after a double from Kelan Swales was added to by a George Green penalty and an Antony Brown strike in a 4-0 win at home over Wombwell Town.

Barton Town and Knaresborough Town climb into fourth and fifth, respectively, after picking up victories. Aran Basi's own goal in the seventh minute put Barton ahead at home to Albion Sports before Thomas Waudby quickly doubled their advantage and, although Samuel Cisse grabbed one back for the Lions in the second half, Joel Shepherd snubbed out any chance of a recovery as he claimed the Swans' third in a 3-1 win.

Knaresborough defeated hosts Thackley 3-0, Jack Dyche's first half opener added to by goals from Theodore Hudson and Slater Barkham-Barnes. Handsworth took a point in a 2-2 draw at Campion, keeping them sixth, Scott Ruthven's penalty levelled it after Patrick Sykes struck twice for Campion and Mitchell Dunne had given the Ambers hope.

The other two games ended in draws as Parkgate were held 0-0 at home by Eccleshill United. And, Glen Sani put Beverley Town ahead at Golcar United before a penalty from Golcar's Ryan Wadsworth meant that the game ended as a 1-1 draw.





Match Reports

Frickley 1 Thackley 0

The Azzurri ground out a gritty 1-0 victory over Thackley, with a moment of brilliance from Luis Afonso Ferreira sealing all 3 points in a tight and hard fought contest at The Wezzie.

The Blues started on the front foot, with Destiny, Tom A, and Spence linking up in the 2nd minute only for the shot to be blocked. Thackley responded quickly, rolling the ball dangerously across goal on 6 minutes, but The Blues' defence stood firm.

Sykesy was called into action several times in the opening quarter of an hour, producing a fine stop at the near post to a difficult, low shot and later gathering another effort, even though it looked to be drifting wide.

At the other end, Destiny caused problems with his pace but was twice thwarted by the notorious Wezzie Bobble, the unpredictable bounce frustrating The Blues' attacking play.

Tempers flared in the 19th minute as both number 9s, Destiny and his Thackley counterpart, went into the referee's book after a bit of a Dynamite Kid v Rollerball Rocco moment. Continuing the wrestling them, seconds later, Tom A was subjected to a Giant Haystacks-style clothesline but only a free kick was given, coming to nought.

Robbo and Destiny both went close as the half wore on, while Sykes continued to look solid, sweeping up trouble outside his area.

Sam Tingle's free kick on 39 minutes caused mild panic in the Thackley box, but The Blues couldn't convert. Despite a flurry of half chances before the break, the sides went in goalless, the match resembling a fascinating game of chess. HT 0-0. The Boys in Blue began the second half with intent, as Tom A tested the keeper inside 20 seconds. Destiny and Robbo also kept him on his toes, while Woolly was only denied by a superb point blank save after a corner was worked back into the box.

At the other end, Sam Kilner took his eye off the ball for a split second, allowing a Thackley forward to break through. However, Killer produced the most outstanding outstanding last-ditch tackle you're ever likely to see to prevent a certain goal for Thackley. Bottesford Town 1 Frickley 0

The Blues fell to another agonising 1-0 defeat on the plastic at Bottesford in a match where the two sides largely cancelled each other out. The Blues were ultimately undone by a single second half gone that probably should have been disallowed. The game began with Bottesford almost seizing the lead inside the opening 3 minutes. A long ball forward caused problems in the Frickley defence, and after Collins appeared to be illegally nudged off balance, the home striker raced through on goal. Fortunately for The Blues, the effort struck the post and bounced out for a goal kick. Otherwise, the opening stages were scrappy, with both sides battling for control. On 13 minutes, Bottesford fashioned a half chance from a cross, but the midfielder arriving late could only send his effort over the bar. Moments later, Frickley began to settle, Luis AF delivering from the right before the danger was cleared by a covering defender. The first real clear cut opportunity for The Azzurri arrived on 16 minutes. Destiny twisted and turned out wide before whipping in an excellent cross that found Tom A. His header forced a fingertip save from the home keeper, who had to claw the ball away, low to his right.

As the half wore on, the contest remained competitive but disjointed, with niggly and questionable fouls breaking up the rhythm. Spence dragged a shot wide on 34 minutes after Radz flicked the ball into his path, and shortly after Robbo delivered a teasing ball across the face of goal that somehow evaded everyone. Bottesford reminded those present of their threat at the other end, on 39 minutes, when Sykes was needed to be quick to block a shot before tipping the follow up effort over the bar.

Not long before the break, The Blues created another opening when Tom A's cross found Radz at the far post, and his header caused panic in the Bottesford box before being scrambled behind for a corner. From the resulting set piece, the keeper claimed under pressure but went down holding the ball, much to the frustration of the Blue contingent.

ON THIS DAY IN FOOTBALL - 23RD AUGUST

1958 - Scunthorpe United played their first league game in the second tier of the EFL, their first League match as Scunthorpe United (they had previously been Scunthorpe & Lindsay United) and it saw the official opening of the first cantilever stand in British football. It finished as a 1-1 draw against Ipswich Town. Brighton & Hove Albion were also playing their first ever Second Division game. However, they lost 9-0 at Middlesbrough – their record EFL defeat and Middlesbrough's record EFL victory with 5 of those goals being scored by Brian Clough.

1978 – New Tottenham Hotspur signings, Argentine World Cup stars Ossie Ardiles and Ricky Villa made their home debut at White Hart Lane. But visitors Aston Villa beat newly-promoted Spurs 4-1.

1986 - Hartlepool United's Victoria Ground hosted 2 matches on the same day. In the afternoon Hartlepool played Cardiff City in Division 4 while in the evening neighbours Middlesbrough played Port Vale in Division 3.

FOOTBALL FOR EVERYONE



Linked to The Lane

I'm an incorrigible collector of old A&BC, Panini, Merlin, Topps, etc. football cards and stickers, and it struck me how many of the players pictured had links to Frickley Athletic. They might have played for or against us at some point, or are related to one of The Azzurri past or present. Or the connection might be even more tenuous! But you can be sure it was the highlight of their career :)

It's an FA Vase day so we need an FA Vase link. Graham Fenton, who has played and managed at The Wezzie more than once and won the FA Vase more than once too, fits the bill perfectly.

A Geordie, born in 1974 in Whitley Bay, Fenton's technical ability and eye for goal stood out from an early age and won him a place in the youth system at Aston Villa. He broke into the first team in the early 1990s and, though often used as a squad player, he was part of a strong Villa side under Ron Atkinson. He also had a short, very successful, loan spell at West Brom.

One of the most memorable moments of his early career came in 1994, when Aston Villa defeated Manchester United 3-1 at Wembley to win the League Cup. Fenton played every minute in that final as Villa lifted the trophy.

It was during his time at Villa Park that he made his only appearance for the England U21 team.

After playing 30 league games and scoring 3 goals for Villa, he transferred to Blackburn Rovers in 1995. Though not a regular starter, Fenton's time at Ewood Park would see him play a pivotal role in one of the more dramatic title races in Premier League history.

In April 1996, Blackburn faced Newcastle United, who were chasing leaders Manchester United. Fenton, a boyhood Newcastle fan, came off the bench and stunned his hometown club with two

late goals to secure a 2-1 win for Blackburn. The result not only dented Newcastle's title challenge but effectively swung the momentum back towards Manchester United, etching Fenton's name into Premier League folklore.

Following his spell at Blackburn, Fenton played for Leicester City, Blackpool and Stoke City, before gradually moving into non-league football, turning out for Blyth Spartans and North Shields. As his playing days wound down, Fenton moved into management. First, he made a big impact at North Shields, guiding the club to a historic FA Vase triumph at Wembley in 2015, defeating Glossop North End 2-1. It was a defining moment for the club and for Fenton, who had successfully translated his on field experience into leadership and tactical know how from the dugout.

He then moved a short distance across the River Tyne and took the reins at South Shields, initially as joint manager with Lee Picton, at a time when the club had serious ambitions of climbing the non-league pyramid. In 2017, he once again tasted FA Vase glory, with South Shields, as they beat Cleethorpes Town 4-0 in the final at Wembley. That season, South Shields also won the Northern League and a

couple of other local trophies, completing a remarkable campaign that cemented Fenton's reputation as one of the most capable managers in the non-league game. Fenton left South Shields in 2022 for the Blyth Spartans hot seat, but only lasted a season. Nonetheless, whilst not a household name, whether playing in the

Premier League or at Wembley to managing in the Northern League, Graham Fenton's contributions to football are a testament to the impact an individual can have across many levels of the game.

And no doubt he'll be back in the game doing the same, and possibly a bit of Wezzie-worrying, in no time at all.

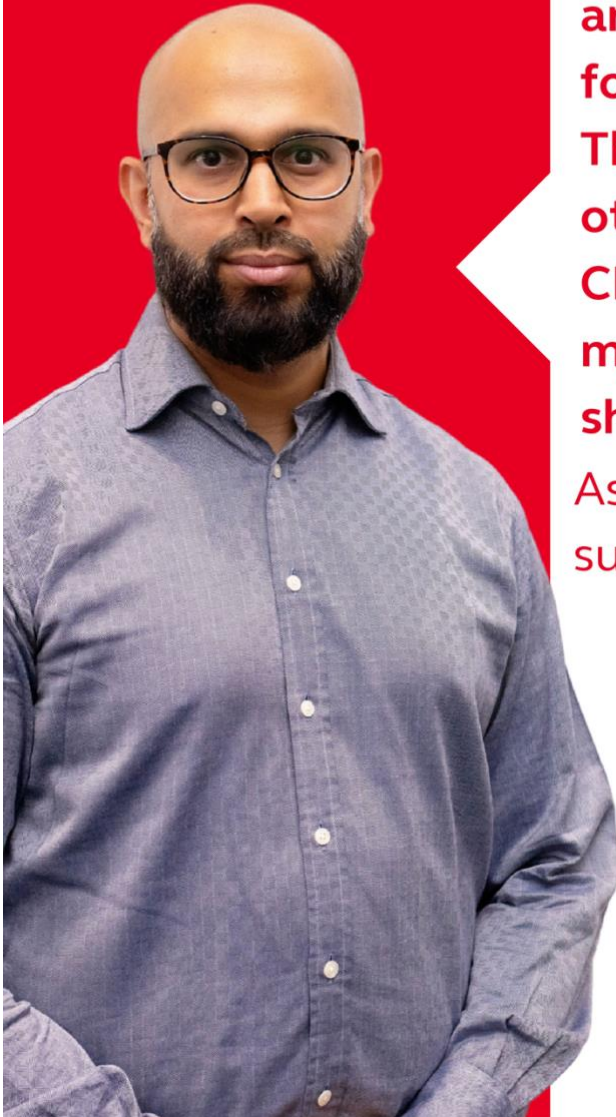
