Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen, and a merry Christmas to you all. Welcome to The SALUS Stadium for today's Northern Counties East Premier Division game against Penistone Church. We give a warm welcome to Penistone's players, officials and supporters and hope they have a safe trip home after the game.

Today's match is sponsored by Paul Stanley Fenn and the match ball is sponsored by Kestrel Sports. We thank them for their kind support of the club.

Today's visitors, Penistone Church, currently sit in 16th place on 25 points after 24 games. Church's recent form has seen them take a point from a 1-1 draw at home to Beverley Town, followed by 2 losses away from home, 3-1 at Eccleshill United and 4-2 at Rossington Main. Then last weekend, Penistone twice let a lead slip to draw 2-2 with Horbury Town at home.

The Blues come into today's game in 10th place on 32 points after 24 games. We are currently on a pretty decent run of 1 defeat in 10 in the league. Since that single defeat, a 6-0 drubbing at Knaresborough Town, a 4 goal haul by Lucas Robinson alongside goals from Tom Alngohuru, Destiny Ifeanyi Nnenanua and Elliott Andrew, carried us to a 7-0 victory at Thackley, then Tom Radley, Martyn Woolford, Lucas Robinson and Charlie Clegg got on the scoresheet in our 4-1 win at Albion Sports. Returning to The Wezzie, we edged past Bottesford Town,

thanks to Lucas Robinson and Tom Alngohuru strikes, despite being down to 10 men for half the game. And last Saturday, it was a first half own goal that allowed us to grind out a dogged 1-1 draw at Tadcaster Albion.

Our most recent meeting with Penistone Church was our league game in August at the Memorial Ground. The scoreline, a 2-0 win for The Azzurri, with goals from Destiny and Luis Afonso Ferreira, belied our dominance. It also represented a complete turnaround from the heavy 7-2 reverse we suffered on the last day of the 2024/25 season at the same venue. Our most recent league game with Penistone Church here at The Wezzie was in August 2024 and resulted in another defeat. Jack Varley's goal and a late own goal we're not enough to prevent us going down 4-2.

Expect both sides to be going hell for leather to take all 3 points, and to run off that Crimbo turkey too ;)

Our next game sees The Blues travel to top of the table Liversedge on Saturday 3rd January, 3pm kickoff. The Blues are next in action here at Westfield Lane on Saturday 10th January when Parkgate are our visitors, 3pm ko. We hope to see you all there.

Enjoy the game and as always we thank you for your valued and continued support.

Meet The Visitors

In the early 1900s football in Penistone was being played by Penistone Juniors FC.

In 1906 the Juniors amalgamated with players from Penistone Church Choirboys and a new team was formed under the name of Penistone Church FC. The newly formed club played their games on the local park. In 1908 we were the first winners of the Sheffield League Cup and, on their return from the cup final, the players were met at the train station by over 2000 people who carried them shoulder high to the then headquarters, The Spread Eagle public house. We won this cup again in 1938. It was in 1949 that the Hinchliffe family donated the present day land to the Penistone community in memory of the dead from the

two World Wars. Mr Hinchliffe stipulated that the ground must be called the Memorial Ground and it could only be used for the local community to play sport. For many years the teams played in the old Penistone league, winning both the league and cup. They then joined the Hatched League which they won and also the County Senior league. When these leagues amalgamated in 1982, Penistone Church were founder members with both their teams being accepted into the league and is where our reserves play to this day. Our first team played in this league until 2014/15 season when they were promoted to the Northern Counties East League. In our first season we finished a respectable 9th and in our second season 5th enabling us into the play-off semi final which we narrowly lost to AFC Emley. Our third season in the NCEL (2016/17) was our most successful ever, as we won promotion to the Premier Division by beating AFC Emley in the Play-off Semi Final and Grimsby Borough in the final. We finished the season off by winning the NCEL Cup against Bridlington Town in the final at Bramall Lane.

Our first season at NCEL Premier Division level was another successful one including finishing 7th in the league and reaching the Sheffield & Hallamshire Senior Cup final for the first time in our history where we were narrowly beaten by Shaw Lane. We also had our best ever run in the FA Cup reaching the first qualifying round where we were knocked out by Harrogate Town.

In our second season in the Premier Division (2018/19) yet again we had another successful

season being top of the league for a time before a strong finish from Worksop Town saw them crowned champions and us finishing 2nd, our highest ever position in our history. For most of the 2019/20 season we were in the top 3, only for the season to be cut short by the pandemic. We exited the FA Cup after a replay in the extra preliminary round and despite getting a bye into the first round of the FA Vase we fell at that stage. Sadly the 2020/21 season was also badly affected by the pandemic. We again exited the FA Cup in the extra preliminary round narrowly losing 3-2 at Skelmersdale. In the FA Vase we reached the second round where we we lost on penalties to Longridge Town. With the league again being abandoned, the final standings were decided on a ppg average over the past two curtailed seasons. We were not high enough to gain promotion.

In September 2021 long term manager Ian Richards left the club to take up a new position elsewhere and, after a reshuffle, former first team goalkeeper and reserve team manager Stephen Lenthall took over with help from another former player John Whitehead as assistant. This brought about a transformation of the team's fortunes, after a poor start they rose from 18th in the table to eventually finishing 6th. They went one better in 2022/23 with a strong 5th place finish. 2023/24 saw Lenthall and Whitehead as joint managers with club legend Brett Lovell stepping up as assistant. Another successful season was had, finishing in 6th position, narrowly missing out on a playoff place. The team also made it to the Sheffield Senior Cup Final losing 5-0 to Worksop Town at Hillsborough.

The 2024/25 season starts with the club again in a great position to maintain and potentially improve upon their high finishes of the past 3 seasons.

In the 2024/25 season there were early exits from the FA Cup and FA Vase. And after again pushing for the play offs an 8th place finish was the outcome. At the season's end, manager Stephen Lenthall decided to step down after many years playing and managing teams at the club, but he stays involved on the club committee.

Suitable presentations were made to both at an emotional last game. Brett Lovell and John Whitehead take over the management duties for 2025/26.





Frickley's History

Frickley Athletic FC is based in the former coal mining village of South Elmsall. Recent research has shown that the first South Elmsall football team was formed in 1905 but was superseded in 1908 by the newly formed Frickley Colliery Athletic Club and joined the South Yorkshire league which comprised of works, church and village teams. In 1910, the football club moved to the Sheffield Association League and first played in the FA Cup.

The club remained in the Sheffield Association League (except for the war years) until 1922, finishing runners up in 1911/12, and winners in 1920/21, our only ever league title.

In 1922/23 Frickley joined the Yorkshire league and after finishing runners up in 1923/24, the club were elected into the Midland League. Although the club had to apply for re election several times pre war (and didn't play in any league in 1933/34) it was kept going by the support of the mineworkers and the sale of players.

1936/37 was Frickley's worst ever league season when the club finished bottom with only 8 points, but amazingly reached the FA Cup 1st round proper for the first time.

Post war, Frickley remained in the Midland league gaining its best finish, 7th, in 1945/46, but left the league on its break up at the end of 1959/60.

From 1960/61 to 1969/70, Frickley Colliery played in the Cheshire County League. However, financial considerations led the club to join the Midland Counties League for 1970/71. They finished runners up in 1972/73, and were eventually elected into the NPL for the 1976/77 season as Frickley Athletic.

After finishing 3rd in 1979/80, the club was promoted into the Alliance Premier League, now the National League. Here they remained for 7 years, the most successful in the club's history, and in 1985/86 reached the FA Cup 3rd round proper, after beating a Football League club, Hartlepool Utd, only to lose 3-1 at home to Rotherham Utd. The club also finished as Gola League runners up. The following season saw a reversal as we were relegated back to the NPL. From 1987/88 to 1991/92 the club consistently finished around mid-table in the NPL, but did manage to reach the league cup final in 1991/92, losing 1-0 to Marine at Maine Road.

The next few seasons saw Frickley finish in the lower reaches of the table. Then, in 2005/06 The

Blues had their best league season for 20 years, finishing 2nd to Blyth Spartans. Unfortunately, the Blues lost on penalties in the playoff semi.

In the following seasons Frickley returned to the lower half of the table, but 2015/16 saw the club have a great season to finish 7th.

In 2016/17, most of the players who had brought this success were attracted to more affluent clubs. The club were relegated from the NPL Premier Division after a 30 year stay.

2017/18 saw the club enter the NPL Division 1 South, finishing 3rd in the league, scoring a record 117 goals. Additionally, Jacob Hazel broke the club record for individual goals in a season with 47 strikes. The season ended disappointingly with playoff semi final defeat at the hands of Stamford.

2018/19, in the new NPL East Division, was less successful, seeing managerial changes and a 12th place finish. However, the season had its highlights, with victory at highflying Morpeth and a 10-1 win over Liversedge in the FA Cup.

More change followed prior to the start of 2019/20. A further league reorganisation which put The Blues into the NPL South East Division was accompanied by a new manager. An inauspicious start lead to the appointment of Dave Frecklington in September 2019.

Frecks rapidly turned the side's fortunes around, before lockdown ended the season. 2020/21 ultimately suffered the same fate.

Frecks built what looked like strong squad for the 2021/22 season in the newly formed NPL East Division. However, things didn't pan out as hoped. Key departures lead to a run of form that saw the club relegated to the Northern Counties East League for the first time in our history.

In the summer of 2022, former Blue, Wayne Benn, was installed as manager, with ex-Frickley goal scoring legend Andy Hayward as his assistant. There were occasional highs but Benn resigned in early 2023 so Patrick McGuire came in to avoid a second successive relegation.

2023/24 started well, and included an 8-0 win at Goole, but ended with the release of McGuire.

James Baxendale was in the hot seat for the start of 2024/25 but left to be replaced by Tom Claisse in November 2024 and successfully avoided the drop before being relieved of his duties in September 2025.

Club legend Martyn Woolford has taken the reigns and he'll be looking to roll back the years and bring winning ways back to Westfield Lane.

As usual, we've got 2 memory matches for you. This week we have a pair of almost 'on this day' games – one from either side of today's date, both played here at The Wezzie. And in homage to our recent 7-up at Thackley, both games saw us rack up 7 goals. The first match was against Alfreton Town in the NPL Premier Division, played on Saturday 28th December 1996. The Blues scored a magnificent 7 goals, with Gary Duffy getting 4 of them, to win 7-2. Then the second game is an Alliance Premier League fixture from Monday 26th December 1983. The Azzurri dished out a drubbing to old rivals Boston United, with a list of legends, Russ Wilcox, Paul Wilson, Graham Reed and Barry Gill, getting on the scoresheet. With thanks to JL.

Blues' Duffy deftly does it

FRICKLEY ATHLETIC ended the year in sharp-shooting style with a 7-2 victory over Alfreton Town in the Unibond Premier Division game at Westfield Lane with Gary Duffy doubling his tally by scoring four times.

It was a superb display by the Blues who took charge from the start and, apart from a slight hiccup midway through the second half, never allowed Town a chance.

Mark Dempsey and Mark Hancock went close with a couple of 20-yard free kicks before the home side took the lead in the 19th minute, Duffy racing onto a flick by Ian Dring and hitting the target from 15 yards.

A back header by Dempsey put Dring clear four minutes later but he delayed his shot and Atkinson cleared off the line, although the Blues increased their advantage after 28 minutes when Ian Thompson stroked a free kick into the path of Hatto who

left the visiting keeper stranded with a scorching 30-yard drive.

Hatto pumped a looping cross into the Alfreton goalmouth and Duffy struck again in the 35th minute, completing his hat-trick a minute before the interval when another piece of deadly poaching after Dring had pulled the ball back into his path.

Two minutes after the resumption Duffy broke down the left, beat a defender and lobbed Paul Norton from 15 yards to claim his fourth goal.

Alfreton were shot-shocked, Hancock shaving a post with a 25-yard drive in the 56th minute while a free kick by Kelly a minute later was headed down by Hancock for

Dring to score with a dipping 20-yard shot.

The Blues made a double substitution in the 61st minute and, although not losing their rhythm, the concentration on attack left a few gaps and Alfreton seized on a rare mistake by keeper Tommy Allen to reduce the arrears through Ian Straw in the 72nd minute.

Darren Field was harshly penalised for a tackle four minutes later and Neil Pickering converted the spot kick for Town. But Frickley responded within a minute, Field providing a pinpoint cross for Scott Armstrong to strike a first time volley which zipped into the far corner of the net.

The Blues maintained their momentum with Duffy putting Dempsey away down the left in the 85th minute and his rising drive went inches wide.

Frickley entertain Work-sop Town in the Sheffield Senior Cup quarter-finals on Tuesday at 7.30pm.

MUCH of Frickley's recent promise was fulfilled on Boxing Day as they went on a second half scoring spree at the expense of Boston United.

In the second half the barrage began after only three minutes with Wilson

heading Frickley into a 3-1 advantage.

Graham Reed joined the scoring spree — albeit from the penalty spot — just before the hour and added a second with a screaming 30 yard drive.

Boston's humiliation continued when Wilson volleyed home with almost half an hour still to play.

But as Frickley relaxed and Boston tried to salvage some pride, the goal blitz dried up for the rest of the half.

Just before the end, however, Barry Gill crowned a fine personal performance by striking the seventh goal with a fierce close range drive.

NCEL News

Sheffield led the goal charge in the Macron NCEL on the final weekend before Christmas as they reached double figures at home to Albion Sports on Saturday.

There were hat-tricks for Harrison Poulter and Alexander Hardwick whilst Luke Mangham struck twice and Joe West and Nathan Whitehead also got on the scoresheet as they thrashed visitors Albion Sports 10-2.

The Lions had taken the lead through Nathan Cartman before the floodgates opened in the hosts' favour and Samuel Drake added his side's second in the last ten minutes.

Sheffield move up into third spot whilst Sports stay in the bottom two and both sides will be wishing for points for vastly different reasons as we go into the festive period and the New Year. Liversedge maintain their eight point lead at the summit as they edged past visitors Rossington Main, the side just above the relegation zone on goal difference.

Antony Brown gave Sedge a 13th minute breakthrough but parity was quickly restored by Shaun Tuton before Kelan Swales' strike before half-time turned out to be the winner in a 2-1 victory.

McCauley Snelgrove scored four as second-placed Beverley Town won 5-0 at Campion, Jack Humphreys with their other goal on a comfortable afternoon for the visitors.

Handsworth who dropped to fourth after their 4-1 loss to hosts Pickering Town.

The Pikes are up to ninth as they brought a five-match losing streak to an end with a Souleymane Coulibaly brace and one each for Dominic Weston and Maximilian Bauer whilst Fernando Tavares found the net for Handsworth.

Barton Town remain fifth after a 1-1 draw.

Thomas Waudby put Barton ahead at Thackley but Keanen Mannings struck late on to share the spoils.

There were two goals each for Ben Gelder and Slater Barkham-Barnes as Knaresborough Town claimed a 6-2 win at Bottesford Town whilst Hayden Goddard, Harry Day and Alister Haydock were the scorers as Parkgate defeated visitors Wombwell Town 3-0.

And, four goals were shared at the Parker Roofing Memorial Ground between hosts Penistone Church and Horbury Town with

Samuel Kyeremeh grabbing an injury-time equaliser for the away side in a 2-2 draw. One game in the Premier Division fell foul to the bad weather as Golcar United's home clash with Eccleshill United was postponed due to a waterlogged pitch.

In Division One, two matches also suffered the same fate with Doncaster City's trip to Club Thorne Colliery as well as Athersley Recreation at home to Crowle Colts called off.

And, Winterton Rangers' home game with Brigg Town was abandoned after 68 minutes due to fog with the scores level at 1-1.

Dearne & District's ten-point advantage at the summit remains intact after late goals from Curtis Wilkinson and Adam Baskerville claimed a 2-0 home win for them over Leeds UFCA.

Second-placed Harrogate Railway Athletic beat visitors Appleby Frodingham 5-0, Harry Lynn striking twice in the opening four minutes before Alex Ingham, Harris Eggleston and Benjamin Parkes kept them firmly on Dearne's trail with five games in hand of the leaders.

Josh Brown got the only goal of the game as third-placed Worsbrough Bridge Athletic prevailed at South Leeds, one of three matches played on Friday night.

That evening's other two fixtures saw big home wins with Michael Dunn's hat-trick helping Armthorpe Welfare to a 6-2 victory over Goole AFC and Zak Khan made it 45 for the season as his three goals went a big way to Route One Rovers' 5-1 triumph at Ilkley Town's expense. In the remaining Saturday fixtures, Maltby Main and Selby Town were winners on their travels whilst Louth Town shared the points with visitors Wakefield AFC.

Ashley Flynn struck twice as Main beat Glasshoughton Welfare 5-2 with both of the home goals coming from Lamin Drammeh.

Harry Douglas, Charlie Birdsall and Harry Clapham all scored in the last ten minutes as Selby won 3-0 at Nostell Miners Welfare.

And, Wakefield thought they had taken the points as Thomas Hinton and Jerome Greaves netted late on to give them a 2-1 lead but Louth claimed a draw with Harris Dunn's injury-time leveller.





Match Reports

Frickley 2 Bottesford Town 1

The Blues mounted a heroic rearguard action to grind out a tense victory over Bottesford Town, after being controversially reduced to 10 men for the entire second half.

With less than 2 minutes gone, Destiny whipped a low ball across the 6 yard box, only for every Blue shirt to miss it by a stud's length.

Bottesford replied with a free kick headed over.

And Kilner's tackle on 15 minutes averted danger, as did Booth's holding onto a long range effort.

The Azzurri soon reasserted control. In the 18th minute, Robbo set Destiny away, the forward's first attempt smacking off the keeper before he rounded him, only to fire into the side netting.

A minute later Radz was bundled over in the area, but the ref waved play on. Not the last 'interesting' piece of officiating that we'd see.

Booth had to punch clear a cross on 24 minutes, and the loose ball was driven wide. And Bottesford tried their luck from distance but it flew well wide.

From then on, it was one way traffic towards the visitors' goal. Robbo burst into the box and squared for Destiny, whose shot cannoned off the upright. Just past the half hour mark, Destiny returned the favour, threading a pass through to Robbo whose wormburner also came back off the post. But within half a minute, Robbo controlled a pass, turned and hit it from around 20 yards, and it arced over the keeper into the net.

The Azzurri weren't done. Destiny lashed over from a tight angle on 38 minutes, Cleggy forced the keeper into a sharp low stop a minute later, and moments before the break Destiny flicked on a cross for Robbo, who hit the side netting.

Then came the flashpoint. Deep into added time, Cleggy slid into a tackle, taking the ball cleanly but upending his opponent. The ref eventually deemed it a 'reckless challenge' and pulled out a red card. It wasn't. Frickley went into the break a goal up but a man down. HT 1-0.

The Azzurri were playing down the slope after the restart but faced an uphill battle with 10 men.

Bottesford pressed intensely, hemming The Blues in. Yet on 54 minutes, the visitors passed back to their keeper but Tom Alngohuru charged down the clearance, gathered the rebound and slotted home to double the advantage.

However, Bottesford halved the deficit just past

the hour when a rapid counter attack was going nowhere but the forward went looking for contact and took a theatrical tumble in the box to win a spurious penalty. Duly dispatched.

Destiny almost restored the breathing space soon after when he nicked the ball from a defender and shot into the side netting again.

Bottesford continued to press while The Blues continued to defend like demons. Booth was rounded on 71 minutes but Love stormed back to hack clear. Another chance fizzed wide a minute later, and a free kick was headed wide with a little over 10 minutes to play. Butch and Andrew entered the fray for Woolly and Destiny as legs began to tire.

The closing stages were frantic. As the clock ran down, ever more slowly it seemed, a Bottesford volley from a corner cleared the bar. And Robbo rifled a shot across the face of goal.

In the 5th minute of stoppage time, Booth was beaten by a header but the massed ranks of Blue defenders were there to clear it off the line and seal a memorable win. FT 2-1.

The Blues finished the night outnumbered, under siege, and running on fumes, but we fight to the death and those 3 points were ours.

WEBMASTER MOTM – that was a performance shaped as much by resolve as by quality, as it had to be given the circumstances. Every single man gave all he had. Booth is proving a superb deputy for Sykesy between the sticks. Lindley was a tireless runner, as was Cleggy until he was grievously wronged. Inside 4 minutes, Tom A picked out Destiny with his pass, and he surged into the penalty area, only for the keeper to end up sat on the ball.

At the other end, Booth was called into action, producing an outstanding save on 8 minutes to tip a fierce Tadcaster drive onto the post.

Destiny was a constant outlet, showing his strength in the 16th minute to outmuscle a defender, though a bobble off a difficult surface meant that he shinned his shot.

2 minutes later, it was frustration as Destiny was hauled down by the last defender as he was about to go clear, but the ref waved play on.

Booth was on the money again, pulling off a superb 20th minute double save, while Kilner made a first class last ditch tackle, to keep the scores level

Les Bleu nearly went ahead soon after when Andrew latched onto Woolly's perfectly weighted through ball, rounded the keeper, but could only lift his effort over the bar from a tight angle. And Tom A

fired goalwards from distance on 39 minutes, his strike getting deflected over the bar.

The Azzurri made the breakthrough 2 minutes later. Andrew slid a clever pass into Destiny, whose aggressive run harried the desperate defender into poking the ball past his own keeper for an own goal.

The Blues almost doubled the lead before the break when Andrew unleashed a powerful shot from range that flew inches over the crossbar. The home side were at sixes and sevens at this point and the half time whistle came as a relief for them. HT 0-1.

The hosts regrouped and the second period began with Taddy pushing forward. An early chance rolled wide, while Andrew responded with a speculative shot of his own that also missed the target. I usually enjoy a trip to Tadcaster, if only coz it's the closest NCEL club to my house so it's an easy one. And we do at least have a history of getting the odd result or 2 there.

It was a murky midwinter day and the rain had been awful all week. And Ings Lane has a

reputation for getting flooded on a regular basis, due to the close proximity of the River Wharfe, which famously washed away the nearby bridge after Storm Eva in 2015.

Unsurprisingly, the pitch, as good as it is

(Leeds United U18s, U23s and Ladies have called it home in the past), has a tendency to hold water like a sponge. So fair play to Taddy for getting the game on, even if it was a little soft underfoot and did cut up a wee bit.



Otherwise, there's new-looking mural (see below) around the perimeter wall at Ings Lane. Said ground is nestled between the aforementioned river and a couple of breweries. 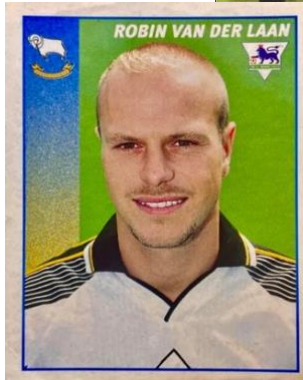
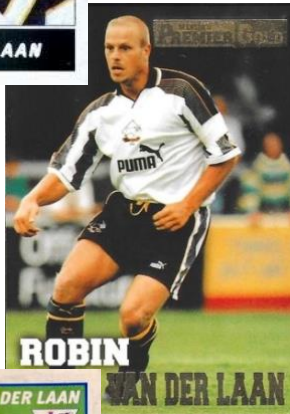


Linked to The Lane

I'm an incorrigible collector of old A&BC, Panini, Merlin, Topps, etc. football cards and stickers, and it struck me how many of the players pictured had links to Frickley Athletic. They might have played for or against us at some point, or are related to one of The Azzurri past or present. Or the connection might be even more tenuous! But you can be sure it was the highlight of their career ;)

It's Christmas so here's a Christmassy robin - Robin van der Laan. As manager of Kidsgrove, he faced The Blues several times in the Northern Premier League. RvdL was born in 1968 in Schiedam in the Netherlands. He began his senior playing career in 1987 with Dutch side SVV (Schiedamse Voetbal Vereniging), where he made 59 league appearances and scored 13 goals. In 1990 he moved to FC Wageningen, adding 27 appearances and 3 goals in the Dutch second tier.

In February 1991 he made the leap to English football, signing for Port Vale for a fee of £80k. Originally brought in as a striker, his manager, John Rudge, soon recognised that van der Laan's real strengths lay deeper, converting him into a box-to-box midfielder. At Port Vale, van der Laan quickly endeared himself to the fans with his relentless energy, tough tackling, and eye for goal. During his 4 seasons at Vale Park he played a key part in the club's success, helping them win



the Football League Trophy in 1993 and earning promotion out of the Second Division in 1993/94. In total for Vale he made over 200 appearances, scoring almost 30 goals.

His performances attracted interest, and in the summer of 1995 he was sold to Derby County for £475k. At Derby he was immediately appointed captain by manager Jim Smith. Perhaps the most memorable moment of his time at Derby came in April 1996, when he scored the goal that secured promotion to the top flight for the club. Van der Laan's stint at Derby was also interspersed with a short loan spell at Wolverhampton Wanderers in late 1996, where he made 7 appearances. However injuries began to affect his playing time, and

by 1998 he moved on to Barnsley for a fee of £325k.

At Barnsley he continued to play until recurring knee problems forced him to retire in 2001, aged 32.

After hanging up his boots, van der Laan didn't leave football. He moved into coaching and youth development, spending time in Canada running his own soccer school

(the RvdL Soccer School and Academy) and working as a senior coach with Manchester United Soccer Schools.

In February 2018 he took on the role of manager at Newcastle Town, a position he held until the summer of 2023, when he stepped down. During his reign, his son Tommy also played for the the Grove.

After leaving the manager's role, he remained involved at the club as a director.

Our meetings with van der Laan's Kidsgrove side were rarely anything other than epic battles with no quarter asked nor given. Jacob Hazel's hat trick in our feisty 3-1 win at Kidsgrove in October 2019, our last league hat trick, remains a personal favourite. Happy days.

Joel Spence (Midfielder): Joel 90 was at Armthorpe before joining us and he's been on the books of Rotherham United before plenty of experience at Belper Town, Ossett United and Wakefield.

Deservedly won player of the season in 24/25.

Will Sykes (Goalkeeper): The Holy Goalie is a highly rated young stopper who joined us from Hallam, against whom he saved a penalty towards the end of last season.

Niall Butchart (Defender/Midfielder/Forward): The Butcher is a versatile squad member. He is a former youth teamer at Altrincham, then was at Winsford United, Swallowhurst, Armthorpe Welfare and Goole.

Tom Alngohuru (Midfielder/Forward): The Guru is a defender's nightmare. He joined last season from Ossett United. Prior to that he was at the York City and i2i academies, and has played almost 80 games for Pickering Town.

Luis Afonso-Ferreira (Midfielder/Forward): The Ferrari is a rapid forward who puts teams on the back foot. He has plenty experience from time at the likes of Retford United, Parkgate and Albion Sports.

Sam Cable (Forward): The Power is a handful of an attacker. Since starting out in our U19s over a decade ago, he is now in his 3rd spell with the club after spells at Barton Town, Garforth Town and others.

Charlie Clegg (Forward): The Power is a local boy and a fan favourite, in his third spell with us. Has experience with Ponte Colls youth programme, Emley, Athersley, Armthorpe and Club Thorne.

Will Jenkinson (Defender): Jenko is a footballing defender who joins us from Parkgate, having started out at Rotherham United.

Sam Kilner (Defender): A NCEL title winner at Silsden last season, Killer is a highly proficient fullback who has also been at Buxton, Mossley, Hemsworth and Knaresborough.

Ifeanyi Nnenanua (Forward): Goes by the name of Destiny, he's a committed young striker who is always in the thick of it. He's been at the i2i academy and has previously played for Pickering Town.

Lucas Robinson (Midfielder/Forward): A rangey winger with an eye for goal, Cool Hand Lucas comes to us from Harrogate Railway but has been at Goole and Barton Town too.

Tyler Sheard (Defender/Midfield/Forward): Versa Tyler is another who can do a job anywhere on the park, team before self every time. And he's another of our U23s stepping up for 1st team duties.

Harley Wilson (Midfielder): With time at Penistone Church, Rossington Main, Wombwell Town and Dinnington Town, Hells Angel is an experienced midfielder at this level.

Thomas Radley (Defender): Radz is a big centre half who was at Shelley last season and brings quality and leadership into our back line.

Harry Gagen (Defender): Gadge is a Rolls Royce of a defender who started out at Barnsley but joined us from Ossett United after an initial loan spell.

Jack Horobin (Defender): Jack The Lad has stepped up from the U18s to make his debut as very capable defensive cover.

Ashton Johnson (Midfielder): AJ is an exciting winger from our U18s who recently made his debut, getting an assist within 5 minutes of coming on!

Dylan Sefton (Goalkeeper): Safe-ton is a solid young keeper who returns after coming through our academy and spending time at Worsbrough Bridge.

Josh Lindley (Midfielder): J-Force is a midfielder signed on dual reg with Ponte Colls. The son of ex-Blue, Phil, he started at Doncaster Rovers, and has been at Ossett, Wombwell Town and Deame & Dist.

Bailey Cowsell (Forward): Bails is an exciting goals scorer from our U23s. Made his first team debut in 2023/24 and has played for Athersley Rec and Wombwell Main since then.

Shaun Heselwood (Midfielder): Hez of The Wez joined us from Selby Town, after spells at Hemingbrough United and Goole AFC, to add drive in the middle of the park.

Elliot Andrew (Forward): The Prince is a quality striker who started out at Doncaster Rovers then Nottingham Forest before more recent spells at Tadcaster, Beverley and Rossington Main.

Spencer Booth (Goalkeeper): The Barrier joins us dual reg with Guiseley. He has also had a spell at Leeds UFCA earlier in the season.

Liam Love (Forward/Midfielder): The Heartbreaker is a goalscorer with experience at Pickering Town and most recently Selby Town.

Lewis Binns (Defender/Midfielder/Coach): Binno is a rock. This local lad has played for local clubs, like South Kirkby and Armthorpe. A Frickley legend, the Supporters' Player of the Season in 22/23 is back from injury, and is part of the coaching team too.

Mike Carmody (Assistant Manager): As a player, MC Hammer was a top defender for Huddersfield and Tranmere in the EFL and for many years at Altrincham. Since retirement, he has managed Armthorpe Welfare and Goole AFC.

Martyn Woolford (Midfielder/Forward/ Manager): The Woolfman started at The Wezzie in 2005 after joining from Glasshoughton Welfare. He is a very classy attacking midfielder who has been in the EFL with the likes of York City, Scunthorpe United, Millwall, Bristol City and Sheffield United since then but he's back home now for a 3rd spell. Took over as player- manager in October 2025.

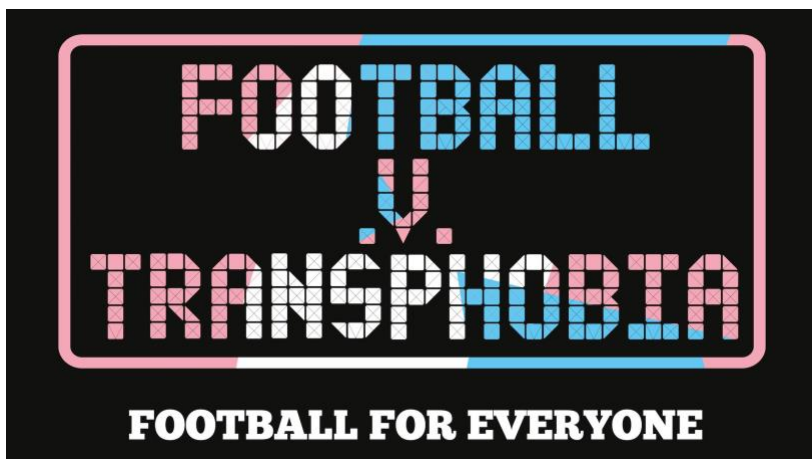

Getting The Boot

Ever get a new pair of football boots for Crimbo? Well, this much-prized footwear has got a bit of history.

The earliest recorded football boots date back to 1526, when King Henry VIII ordered a pair from the royal wardrobe. These were likely sturdy hunting boots rather than anything we would recognise today. For centuries, players wore regular work boots when kicking around a ball, often reinforced with steel toe caps and hobnails for grip. These boots were extremely heavy, not built for speed or control, and certainly not for comfort. By the late 19th century, football was becoming increasingly organised, and in 1891, the rules were changed to allow small leather bars or studs on the soles, the first step toward modern football boots.

In the early 1900s, football-specific boots were made entirely from thick leather, up to the ankles for protection. They weighed around half a kilogram and, when soaked with rain, could easily double in weight. Brands such as Gola, Valsport, and Hummel began to emerge, but innovation was slow, and boots remained largely the same until after the Second World War (top pic).

It was in the post-war period that real change began. South American players led a shift toward lighter, low-cut boots that allowed for better ball control.

In 1954, Adi Dassler, founder of Adidas, introduced screw-in studs that could be changed depending on pitch conditions.

Worn by the West German team in a muddy World Cup final that year, they gave players an edge in traction - a landmark moment in boot history. Adidas dominated the market, with 75% of players at the 1966 World Cup wearing their boots.

Throughout the 1960s, boots became more lightweight and flexible. The 60s also saw a new brand, Stylo Matchmakers, enter the market and gain prominence over time by signing the likes of Bobby Moore, George Best, Pele, Trevor Francis and Kevin Keegan to their brand (bottom pic).

For decades, football boots were black, but in 1970, white boots made a splash, Alan Ball was a keen proponent, and suddenly colour became a



feature of football fashion.

By the 1980s, brands like Puma and Diadora had entered the scene alongside Adidas, and boots were being designed with both performance and comfort in mind. Natural leathers, particularly kangaroo leather, were used for their softness and ability to mould to the foot. And in 1979, Adidas launched the Copa Mundial, a boot that remains a bestseller to this day.

In the 1990s, football boot design became a marketing battleground. The Adidas Predator, developed by former Liverpool footballer Craig Johnston and launched in 1994, used rubber elements to enhance grip and power on the ball. It was a revolution in boot design. Around the same time, Nike entered the market in a big way and would soon become a dominant force, especially after releasing the Mercurial boot in

1998, famously worn by Ronaldo in the World Cup that year.

The early 2000s brought a wave of innovation. Lotto released the first laceless boot in 2006. As the 2010s arrived, the focus shifted to personalisation and lightweight materials. Players began adding names, numbers, flags, and even the names of their children to their boots.

The introduction of blade-style studs, designed to maximise grip in multiple directions, created both excitement and concern, with some questioning their safety.

During this time, synthetic materials began to outpace traditional leather. Polyurethane, mesh, and advanced plastics allowed for lighter, more durable and water resistant boots.

The 2020s have continued the trend of innovation, with technology such as the Aerotrak soleplate and

Carbitex Speedframe, offering explosive energy return. Performance- tracking chips, collared fits, and sustainable materials have also made their way into boot production. The market has come a long way. Today, while Nike and Adidas still dominate, other brands like Puma, New Balance, and Mizuno continue to push boundaries.

As for the future? It's wide open. Will we see boots that adapt mid-match, light up after goals, or display data in real time? Only time will tell what Santa will be leaving under the Christmas tree in years to come.

Liversedge Facts: Noted for its part in the woollen industry, Liversedge is recorded in the Domesday Book as 'Livresc'. Despite being a town of almost 20,000 inhabitants, there is only one road sign in the entire area directing motorists towards Liversedge, situated on the A649 Halifax Road from Bailiff Bridge. Liversedge has been home to John Fozard who helped to design the first of the Harrier Jump jets, and the Burgess brothers, Sam, Luke, Tom and George, all of whom played rugby league for a variety of clubs in England and Australia.

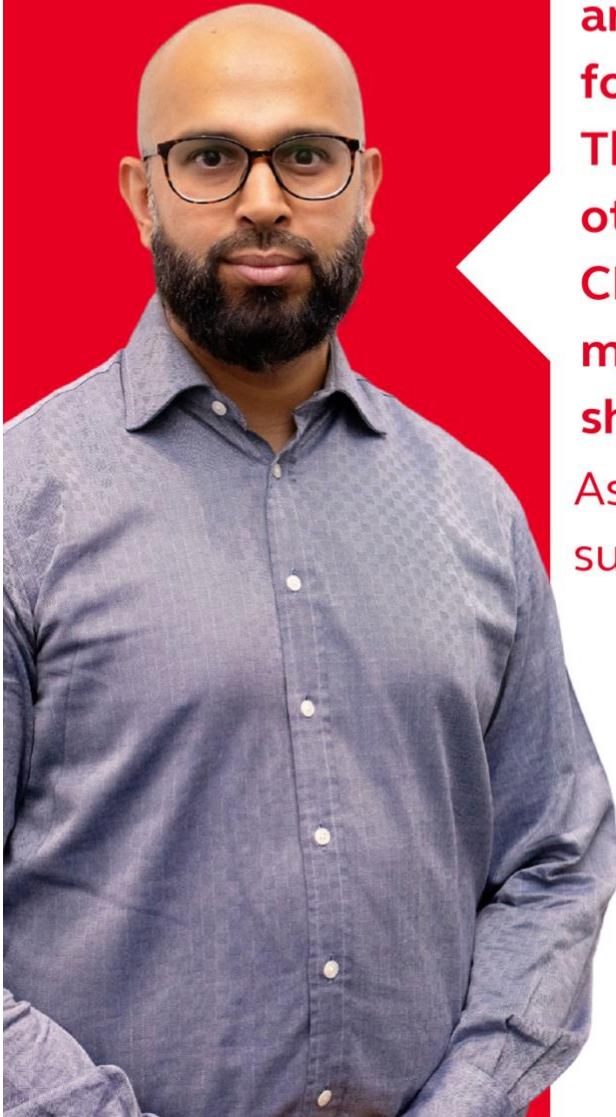
