Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen, welcome to The SALUS Stadium for today's final Northern Counties East Premier Division game of 2025/26 against Horbury Town. We give a warm welcome to Horbury's players, officials and supporters and hope they have a safe trip home after the game.

Today's match ball is sponsored by one of our top volunteers Jerry Wray. We thank him for his continued legendary and kind support of the club.

Today's visitors, Horbury, currently sit in 16th place on 38 points after 37 games. Having come off a run of 4 consecutive drawn games, Horbury lost 2, 3-2 at Sheffield and 2-0 at home to Rossington Main. The spectre of relegation was lessened by their 2-0 victory over fellow strugglers Albion Sports last weekend. A single point is still required to 100% guarantee another season at step 5 without having to rely on results elsewhere.

The Blues come into today's game in 13th place on 41 points after 37 games. Since the 2-0 win against already relegated Wombwell Town, in front of a Friday night crowd of over 300 at The Wezzie, courtesy of goals from Elliott Andrew and Sam Cable, we have suffered a pair of disappointing defeats to sides at the opposite ends of the table. Playoff bound Sheffield were our visitors and won 3-1. Lucas Robinson's late goal gave us hope but Sheffield sealed it with a goal immediately after that. Then last Saturday, we travelled to second from bottom Rossington Main and

were on the receiving end of a 4-0 rout. However, results elsewhere were kind to us and our place in next season's NCEL Premier Division is secured.

Our most recent meeting with Horbury Town was our league game in November 2025 when we played out a goalless draw in heavy conditions at Horbury's Slazengers Sports ground. This was also our only previous meeting with Horbury Town so today is our first meeting here at Westfield Lane.

Expect The Blues to be locking in and doing all they can to end the season on a high to give us our highest ever position and points total in the NCEL.

This is the last game of the season, so the next time The Blues are in action here at Westfield Lane will be at some point in July for pre season games, preparing for the onslaught of 2026/27. Keep an eye on our social media for details that will be released as soon as we have them. We hope to see you all there.

And don't forget that our U23s and both the Ladies' 1st and 2nd teams still have games to play if you need another April Frickley fix. Again, further details will be upcoming on our socials.

Enjoy the game and for a final time in 2025/26, we thank you for your season-long support through thick and thin. Huge thanks as well to all players, management and volunteers, we simply couldn't do this without you all. Missing you all already and can't wait to see you all back at The Wezzie in 2026/27.

Meet The Visitors

Horbury Town was officially formed in the 1964/65 season, but the football team can trace its origins to earlier Horbury sides which were known as the 'Three Castles'. During the 60s and 70s, Horbury Town had a successful period, winning several minor trophies along the way.

During the 80s, the club had to endure some difficult years, plying their trade in the Wakefield Leagues but finally found glory in 1988, winning the Wakefield Division 2 and being accepted into the West Yorkshire League the following season.

In the summer of 1994, the club secured a permanent residence at Slazengers Sports Club, where they still reside to this day. This was a major development for the club, allowing them to build both on and off the field

After securing the Wakefield & District Invitation Challenge Cup in the 2007/08 season, the most successful period at the club came in the 2010s, winning the Wakefield & District Cup (also known as the Cyril Craven Challenge Cup) on 5 occasions - 2011/12, 2013/14, 2014/15, 2017/18 and 2019/20.

Success also followed for our reserve team in 2021/2022, when they created history, winning the West Yorkshire Country Trophy for the first time.

In 2022, the club applied for a position in the Northern Counties East Football League, which required a top 5 finish in the West Yorkshire Premier Division, along with FA ground requirements. Those requirements were achieved, with a second place finish, narrowly missing out on the league title to Horsforth St Margarets by just 2 points, who would also go on to beat the club in the West Yorkshire League Cup final that season.

The club's first season in the NCEL Division 1 was a successful one as the club secured a playoff spot on the final game of the

regular season, beating Beverley Town 3-1 and results in other fixtures going the club's way. A victory at Harrogate Railway the following week meant the club had the opportunity to be promoted at the first time but fell to a defeat against Rossington Main. In the West Yorkshire League, the reserve team also won promotion from Division 2, to Division 1, despite a fifth place finish, thanks to a restructure of all 3 leagues, due to the application of several new clubs.

2023/24 had seen our reserve side promoted once again to the West Yorkshire Premier but due to commitments beyond the club's control, the unfortunate decision to fold the side was made.

However, the club set up an U23s side in the West Riding County FA Development League (Centralised Division) to continue to build the pathway between junior and senior football at the club for up and coming young talent, ensuring and continuing the rise of the club.

The 24/25 season was another historic one for the club, gaining promotion to step 5 of the non-league pyramid. A 4-1 victory away at Maltby Main on the final game of the season saw Horbury clinch the NCEL Division 1 title.

Our U23s side also had a positive season with a third placed finish. The majority of the squad came from the juniors at U17 and U18 level, showing the talent present in the junior section.

The club will be looking to consolidate and continue its progress in its first ever season at step 5 in the NCEL Premier Division in 2025/26.





Frickley's History

Frickley Athletic FC is based in the former coal mining village of South Elmsall. Recent research has shown that the first South Elmsall football team was formed in 1905 but was superseded in 1908 by the newly formed Frickley Colliery Athletic Club and joined the South Yorkshire league which comprised of works, church and village teams. In 1910, the football club moved to the Sheffield Association League and first played in the FA Cup.

The club remained in the Sheffield Association League (except for the war years) until 1922, finishing runners up in 1911/12, and winners in 1920/21, our only ever league title.

In 1922/23 Frickley joined the Yorkshire league and after finishing runners up in 1923/24, the club were elected into the Midland League. Although the club had to apply for re election several times pre war (and didn't play in any league in 1933/34) it was kept going by the support of the mineworkers and the sale of players.

1936/37 was Frickley's worst ever league season when the club finished bottom with only 8 points, but amazingly reached the FA Cup 1st round proper for the first time.

Post war, Frickley remained in the Midland league gaining its best finish, 7th, in 1945/46, but left the league on its break up at the end of 1959/60.

From 1960/61 to 1969/70, Frickley Colliery played in the Cheshire County League. However, financial considerations led the club to join the Midland Counties League for 1970/71. They finished runners up in 1972/73, and were eventually elected into the NPL for the 1976/77 season as Frickley Athletic.

After finishing 3rd in 1979/80, the club was promoted into the Alliance Premier League, now the National League. Here they remained for 7 years, the most successful in the club's history, and in 1985/86 reached the FA Cup 3rd round proper, after beating a Football League club, Hartlepool Utd, only to lose 3-1 at home to Rotherham Utd. The club also finished as Gola League runners up. The following season saw a reversal as we were relegated back to the NPL. From 1987/88 to 1991/92 the club consistently finished around mid-table in the NPL, but did manage to reach the league cup final in 1991/92, losing 1-0 to Marine at Maine Road.

The next few seasons saw Frickley finish in the lower reaches of the table. Then, in 2005/06 The

Blues had their best league season for 20 years, finishing 2nd to Blyth Spartans. Unfortunately, the Blues lost on penalties in the playoff semi.

In the following seasons Frickley returned to the lower half of the table, but 2015/16 saw the club have a great season to finish 7th.

In 2016/17, most of the players who had brought this success were attracted to more affluent clubs. The club were relegated from the NPL Premier Division after a 30 year stay.

2017/18 saw the club enter the NPL Division 1 South, finishing 3rd in the league, scoring a record 117 goals. Additionally, Jacob Hazel broke the club record for individual goals in a season with 47 strikes. The season ended disappointingly with playoff semi final defeat at the hands of Stamford.

2018/19, in the new NPL East Division, was less successful, seeing managerial changes and a 12th place finish. However, the season had its highlights, with victory at highflying Morpeth and a 10-1 win over Liversedge in the FA Cup.

More change followed prior to the start of 2019/20. A further league reorganisation which put The Blues into the NPL South East Division was accompanied by a new manager. An inauspicious start lead to the appointment of Dave Frecklington in September 2019.

Frecks rapidly turned the side's fortunes around, before lockdown ended the season. 2020/21 ultimately suffered the same fate.

Frecks built what looked like strong squad for the 2021/22 season in the newly formed NPL East Division. However, things didn't pan out as hoped. Key departures lead to a run of form that saw the club relegated to the Northern Counties East League for the first time in our history.

In the summer of 2022, former Blue, Wayne Benn, was installed as manager, with ex-Frickley goal scoring legend Andy Hayward as his assistant. There were occasional highs but Benn resigned in early 2023 so Patrick McGuire came in to avoid a second successive relegation.

2023/24 started well, and included an 8-0 win at Goole, but ended with the release of McGuire.

James Baxendale was in the hot seat for the start of 2024/25 but left to be replaced by Tom Claisse in November 2024 and successfully avoided the drop before being relieved of his duties in September 2025.

Club legend Martyn Woolford has taken the reigns and he'll be looking to roll back the years and bring winning ways back to Westfield Lane.





Memory Match

As usual, we've got 2 memory matches for you, a pair of almost 'on this day' games. The first match was from the exotically named Lancashire Combination - Cheshire County League Inter League Cup against New Brighton, played on Monday 2nd April 1962, at the Tower Athletic Ground. Braces from Rose and Crompton saw The Blues through this quarter final tie against the former EFL side by 4 goals to 2. Then the second game was played on Saturday 2nd April 1983 when The Azzurri claimed a 2-1 win against hosts and future EFL team Scarborough at the Athletic Ground (which would become the McCain Stadium or the 'Theatre of Chips' in 1988) in the Alliance Premier League. Down to 10 men, and with ex-Scarborough man Sean Marshall having scored an own goal, another Scarborough old boy Peter Howey popped up to net the winner. With thanks to JL.

Vocal backing lifts Frickley

FRICKLEY manager Shaun Marshall was full of praise for the local supporters who made the Bank Holiday trip to the coast to watch the Blues record their fifth successive victory.

"The supporters gave us great vocal backing and the team responded by giving an excellent second half performance," he said.

This victory extended Frickley's winning run to five — their best ever since joining the Alliance — and completed a "double" over their Yorkshire neighbours.

Two goals by former Scarborough player Ian Smith had sunk them at Westfield Lane in January and this time it was the turn of Peter Howey to strike.

Howey had been unable to play in the Westfield Lane encounter because he was still on loan to the Blues from Scarborough at the time.

But he more than made up for missing that game on Saturday when he cut inside to score a superb solo goal which clinched the points for Frickley on the hour.

From a short free-kick by Barry Gill, Howey cut inside the defence and his angled drive received a slight deflection into the top corner of the net.

In the first half, Frickley went ahead through Graham Reed who flicked a Barry Gill free-kick past the home keeper in the 11th minute.

Scarborough equalised when Shaun Marshall, back to replace the unavailable John Overton,

headed into his own net from a cross from the right after 27 minutes.

Tommy Meehan had to make an excellent save, diving to block a shot through a crowd of players a couple of minutes later but he was merely a spectator in the second half.

Shortly before the break Mally Wright was sent off for a lunging tackle on Dawson at the edge of the box.

But Scarborough were unable to take any advantage from their numerical superiority and Frickley marched on to their fifth success.

The NLP Column: Non-League Day Reflections

Non-League Day has once again proved to be a roaring success with a record number of fans clicking through the turnstiles in support of their local clubs.

Celebrating its 16th year in existence, the initiative, started 2010 by Queens Park Rangers fan James Doe, took full advantage of the international break by welcoming supporters of Premier League and EFL clubs through their doors as the Non-League football took centre stage on the fixture calendar.

It proved a day to remember also for 60-year-old retired teacher Danny Burkey (pictured), who was chosen to lead his local team, Ossett United, for a crucial game from the manager's dugout.

Superfan Danny was named as assistant manager for the day as the United hosted

Grimsby Borough in a crunch relegation 6-pointer in NPL East.

Diagnosed with incurable prostate cancer in June 2021, Burkey had planned to attend the match to raise funds and awareness for Prostate Cancer UK. But upon learning of his story, Ossett decided to centre the day around him.

Burkey was introduced to the players by manager James Walshaw during a training session and presented with a personalised bench-coat, plus a shirt emblazoned with 'Burkey 45' – 45 because one man dies every 45 minutes from the disease. Non-League Day now attracts strong and widespread support from the FA, Premier League and Football League clubs to MPs, media organisations, charities, and Non-League teams across the country.

But alarming figures from a survey conducted by sports media brand LiveScore actually reveal low awareness of local clubs, and divided views on the 3pm blackout.

The fans' survey, capturing perspectives from fans of professional clubs, Non-League fans, and those who follow both, showed that just 23% of Non-League fans care about the outcome of a

game – demonstrating that it's not just about winning, but the full experience of following your team and love of the game.

The report also reveals a visibility gap - 55% of professional football club fans say they'd be open to attending Non-League games, but four in ten can't name their local Non-League club.

Additionally, just 27% of professional club fans feel that the 3pm blackout protects Non-League attendances, reopening the age-old debate of its usefulness in the modern game.

The findings shine a light on what draws fans to Non-League football, the barriers that still exist, and the opportunities to strengthen its appeal.

They underline the importance of preserving the fan experience at all levels, while reinforcing the unique role Non-League clubs play in sustaining the spirit and community of the game.

In an era shaped by shifting priorities in the professional game, Non-League Day serves as a timely reminder of football's roots.

Dominic Vye, Marketing Director at LiveScore,

said: "Our fan report underlines the fact that Non-League is not only the lifeblood of English football, but also has significant growth potential - the data shows that the interest is there, but there's a visibility gap.

"With over half of fans of pro clubs being open to attending Non-League games, we want to

champion the unique strengths of further down the pyramid and empower existing fans to bring their friends along to Non-League Day 2026.

"Being able to attend games with your closest friends can act as a powerful catalyst, reconnecting supporters with the heart of the game and ensuring the future of football remains as vibrant at the grassroots as it is at the top."

For regular readers of this column, and for us at The NLP of course, every day is Non-League Day, but these figures from LiveScore prove that more work is required to promote the game at this level and encourage supporters across the UK to attend their local club.

Match Reports

Frickley 1 Sheffield 3

The Blues were edged out by a Sheffield side in the league's top 3, after a hard fought contest played in dreadful conditions. Driving rain, and swirling wind made fluid football a challenge throughout but The Blues refused to wilt and produced a determined display.

Les Bleus threatened early despite the elements. On 2 minutes, a teasing delivery from Robbo found Cable, but he could only graze his effort as a defender recovered to shepherd the ball back to his keeper. 2 minutes later, another dangerous Robbo cross was only partially cleared, dropping to Carmody, whose first time strike just cleared the bar.

For the next 25 minutes, the weather itself was proving the dominant force, disrupting rhythm and making control difficult for both sides. Still, The Blues pressed, and on 30 minutes Robbo nicked possession from a defender and drove forward, only to see his shot blocked and cleared. From the throw in, he was bundled over inside the area, but appeals were waved away.

Shortly after, in the 32nd minute, Robbo again caused problems with a cross that was caught by the wind and drifted over the bar. The deadlock was broken against the run of play to that point by the visitors. Booth produced a fine initial save in the 34th minute, yet Sheffield capitalised from the resulting corner, a scuffed shot giving them the lead.

The Boys in Blue continued to battle, but deep into first-half stoppage time, a string of defensive mishaps allowed Sheffield a simple tap in, doubling their advantage. HT 0-2.

After half time, The Azzurri regrouped and showed more presence and resilience.

In the 50th minute, Booth had to react sharply to keep out a Sheffield effort from a corner, before dealing with a low, skidding 59th minute strike. Changes came as The Azzurri looked for a route back into the game. Cable nearly broke through on 63 minutes, but a recovering defender denied

him at the crucial moment. In the 71st minute, he tried his luck again, signing off by flicking a shot over the bar before making way for Cleggy. Sheffield remained a threat from set pieces, heading wide from a corner on 75 minutes. Les Bleus didn't roll over, and on 81 minutes a neat exchange between Robbo and Cleggy created a chance, but Robbo couldn't generate the power needed and the effort was held. The breakthrough The Azzurri deserved finally arrived in the 83rd minute. Robbo drove past a defender, saw his initial shot blocked, but reacted quickest to fire home at the second attempt, halving the deficit.

However, the response was immediate and cruel. In the 85th minute, Sheffield restored their 2 goal

lead as ex-Blue Luke Mangham headed home from a cross.

A minute later, Booth produced another save, and the visitors dragged the rebound wide.

The Azzurri kept going until the very end, but to no avail. FT 1-3.

There was no shame in that result as The Blues gave it a proper go against highflying opposition in testing circumstances.

WEBMASTER MOTM - it took some grit just to put up with the literal storm, so to play as well showed considerable fortitude.

Harry Viggars lived up to his

name and harried vigorously and Sam Kilner was everywhere. Lucas Robinson made it an even more torrid evening for the opposition defence and Harry Carmody (pictured) had his best game in a Blue shirt. And the rest never took a backward step. But I'm giving the Glitterball to Sam Cable. It was his first start in almost 4 months, and he gave us 70 minutes of hard running and threat. Salutations, Sam!

Rossington Main 4 Frickley 0

The Blues couldn't capitalise on their superior chances in front of goal, letting Rosso off the hook as they moved out of the bottom 2 with this result. Their great escape looks like it might be on.

The game commenced in bright sunshine but with a swirling wind once again playing havoc with the quality of the football on show. It took until the 8th minute for any sort of chance to arrive. The Azzurri tried to break quickly. Cleggy worked it out to Tom A, but the wind carried the ball well over the danger area.

Less than 90 seconds later, the hosts struck at the other end. A defensive slip allowed Rosso through, and their number 9 kept his composure to finish and put Les Bleus behind.

On 17 minutes, The Boys in Blue came close to a leveller when Carmody produced a delightful curling effort with the outside of his boot, only to see it bounce off the bar.

Shortly after, Cable tried his luck from a similar position but saw his shot drift just wide of the upright.

With 25 minutes gone, Rossington briefly threatened again, sending a header across the face of goal that evaded any finishing touch.

In the 35th minute, Tom A's corner unsettled the home defence as it was met with Gagen's header which was seemingly destined for the net before being headed off the line and scrambled away. Rossington had a shot that was well blocked, before another Azzurri set piece in the 39th minute saw Jenko rise highest, his header flashing millimetres over.

On 41 minutes, a dangerous Rossington cross was met by a header at goal, but Jenko was there again to nod away the danger.

Tempers flared as the Rosso keeper went down theatrically under slight contact from Jenko in the 45th minute, earning a harsh yellow card for the Blues defender.

Deep into time added on at the end of the half, Cleggy met Jenko's left wing delivery on the volley but sent it narrowly over the bar. HT 1-0. The Blues showed early intent after the break as a 51st minute ball over the top released Cleggy, but the keeper managed to get his fingertips to the shot, sending it around the post.

Robbo was introduced in place of Cleggy and quickly made his presence felt in the 61st minute

when his through ball created a golden opportunity for Sam Cable, but he dragged his attempt wide.

Further changes followed, with Lindley and Love replacing Tom A and Carmody.

On 64 minutes, Cable went close again, glancing Robbo's cross inches past the post.

In the 66th minute, Kilner got in behind the back 4 but was sent crashing to the ground in the box as the defender made no attempt to play the ball. Nothing given.

Needless to say, Rosso went straight up the other end, worked the ball into the box, and their number 9 finished again to double the lead. Andrew then came on for Cable as Les Bleus searched for a response.

Kilner was shown a yellow for a clumsy challenge in the 74th minute. From the subsequent free kick, Rosso's number 10 slotted the ball through the wall and beat the unsuspecting Sykes.

The game was put beyond doubt with 11 minutes to go. Rossington were allowed to pull the ball back from the byline for their number 10 guide it past Sykes.

Collins replaced Jenko late on, but there was little time left to alter the outcome. FT 4-0.

It turned out to be a difficult afternoon in the end for The Blues, but with results elsewhere going our way, we can't be relegated and our place in the NCEL Premier Division is secured for another season. That's no small achievement on a day when not much else went our way.

Linked to The Lane

I'm an incorrigible collector of old A&BC, Panini, Merlin, Topps, etc. football cards and stickers, and it struck me how many of the players pictured had links to Frickley Athletic. They might have played for or against us at some point, or are related to one of The Azzurri past or present. Or the connection might be even more tenuous! But you can be sure it was the highlight of their career :)

We finish the season with a good 'un, a hero at Doncaster Rovers, Sheffield United and Leeds United. Apologies in advance to those with any Tyke, Owl or Miller allegiances. In 1991/92, The Blues signed a forward from Boston United called Tony Deane. Tony played a handful of games for The Azzurri and even scored for us. But his real claim to fame is that his younger brother is Brian Deane.

The junior Deane was born in Leeds in 1968. As a youth he went to school and played football for Leeds City Boys with future Leeds United legend David Batty. After failing a trial at the Elland Road club though, centre forward Brian was taken on by Doncaster Rovers. He established himself as a regular scorer before moving in 1988 to

Sheffield United for around £25k. There he became a key part of the side promoted to the top flight in 1989/90, forming a potent partnership with Tony Agana. In August 1992, Deane made history when he scored the first goal in the new Premier League against Manchester United. Across 3 spells with Sheffield United he made over 200 league appearances and scored more than 80 goals. In 1993, he joined hometown club Leeds United for a fee of £2.9 million. The highlight of his time there was being part of the team that reached the 1996 League Cup Final at Wembley, although he had to settle for a runners up medal as Aston Villa won 3-0.

After a brief return to Sheffield United, Deane

moved abroad in 1997 to Benfica for £2 million, making a handful of appearances before returning to England later that year, joining Middlesbrough.

At Middlesbrough, he played a more sustained role than is sometimes noted, making over 80 appearances in all competitions and contributing in league and cup matches during the late 1990s. Subsequent spells with Leicester City (where he scored the first competitive goal at the Foxes' newly opened King Power Stadium), West Ham United (where he was part of the squad that won



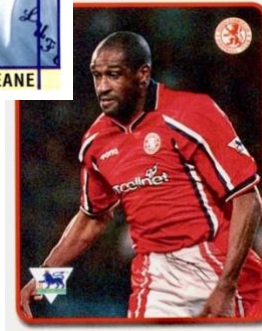
the 1999 Intertoto Cup) and a return to Leeds United added around 100 further league appearances and roughly 30 goals. He later played for Sunderland and Perth Glory, extending his career into the early 2000s.

At international level, Deane won 3 full caps for England, during his time at Sheffield United in 1992.

When he retired in 2006, after 21 years playing professional football, he had made around 770 appearances in all competitions and scored 231 goals,

reflecting both his longevity and a consistency wherever he played.

Since retiring, Deane has dabbled in management with a couple of seasons in Norway in charge of Sarpsborg 08 FF, and was for 6 months a shareholder in the Kosovan club FC Ferizaj. His time has



then been largely occupied with business and advisory work, including roles connected to finance and sports investment, while occasionally appearing in media coverage, particularly in relation to the early years of the Premier League. Nuff said. See you again with more links in 2026/27!

Joel Spence (Midfielder): Joel 90 was at Armthorpe before joining us and he's been on the books of Rotherham United before plenty of experience at Belper Town, Ossett United and Wakefield. Deservedly won player of the season in 24/25.

Will Sykes (Goalkeeper): The Holy Goalie is a highly rated young stopper who joined us from Hallam, against whom he saved a penalty towards the end of last season.

Tom Alngohuru (Midfielder/Forward): The Guru is a defender's nightmare. He joined last season from Ossett United. Prior to that he was at the York City and 121 academies, and has played almost 80 games for Pickering Town.

Luis Afonso-Ferreira (Midfielder/Forward): The Ferrari is a rapid forward who puts teams on the back foot. He has plenty experience from time at the likes of Retford United, Parkgate and Albion Sports.

Sam Cable (Forward): The Power is a handful of an attacker. Since starting out in our U19s over a decade ago, he is now in his 3rd spell with the club after spells at Barton Town and Garforth Town.

Charlie Clegg (Forward): The Power is a local boy and a fan favourite, in his third spell with us. Has experience with Ponte Colls youth programme, Emley, Athersley, Armthorpe and Club Thorne.

Will Jenkinson (Defender): Jenko is a footballing defender who joins us from Parkgate, having started out at Rotherham United.

Sam Kilner (Defender): A NCEL title winner at Silsden last season, Killer is a highly proficient fullback who has also been at Buxton, Mossley, Hemsworth and Knaresborough.

Lucas Robinson (Midfielder/Forward): A rangy winger with an eye for goal, Cool Hand Lucas comes to us from Harrogate Railway but has been at Goole and Barton Town too.

Thomas Radley (Defender): Radz is a big centre half who was at Shelley last season and brings quality and leadership into our back line.

Harry Gagen (Defender): The HGV is a Rolls Royce of a defender who started out at Barnsley but joined us from Ossett United after an initial loan spell.

Elliot Andrew (Forward): The Prince is a quality striker who started out at Doncaster Rovers then Nottingham Forest before more recent spells at Tadcaster, Beverley and Rossington Main.

Jack Horobin (Defender): Jack The Lad has stepped up from the U18s to make his debut as very capable defensive cover.

Cody Collins (Defender): The Force has pedigree, his dad was a pro and 2 uncles played for us. Returns from Barton, after time at Mansfield Town, Gainsborough, Rossington and Bottesford.

Tyler Sheard (Defender/Midfield/Forward):

VersaTyler is one of our U23s who can do a job anywhere on the park, team before self every time.

Ashton Johnson (Midfielder): AJ is an exciting winger from our U18s who recently made his debut, getting an assist within 5 minutes of coming on!

Dylan Sefton (Goalkeeper): Safe-ton is a solid young keeper who returns after coming through our academy and spending time at Worsbrough Bridge.

Josh Lindley (Midfielder): J-Force is a midfielder signed on dual reg with Ponte Colls. The son of ex-Blue, Phil, he started at Doncaster Rovers, and has been at Ossett, Wombwell Town and Deame & Dist.

Bailey Cossell (Forward): Bails is an goalscorer from our U23s. Made his first team debut in 2023/24.

Shayan Keyghobadi (Midfielder): Once at Fulham, The Key is quite capable of unlocking a defence.

Spencer Booth (Goalkeeper): The Barrier joins us dual reg with Guiseley. He has also had a spell at Leeds UFCA earlier in the season.

Liam Love (Defender/Midfielder): The Heartbreaker is a consistent performer with experience at Pickering and most recently Selby.

Harry Carmody (Midfielder): The Modfather is a solid young midfielder who has been at FC Halifax Town's academy, Goole and Glasshoughton.

Harry Viggars (Defender/Midfielder): Dirty Harry is an experienced player, signed on dual reg from Garforth. His 3 seasons there were preceded by 10 at Hemsworth, with a short spell at Ossett United,

1953 - Duncan Edwards made his debut for Manchester United in a 4-1 defeat to Cardiff City in a First Division match at Old Trafford. He was just 16 years 185 days old making him United's youngest ever first team player at the time. He made 177 first team appearances for Manchester United (21 goals) and played 18 times for England (5 goals) before losing his life at Munich in 1958.

1959 - For the first time a club scored double figures in a Division 4 match. Hartlepoons United also set a club record league victory when defeating Barrow 10-1 at the Victoria Ground.

1983 - Wigan Athletic director Bobby Charlton took over as caretaker manager of Wigan after Larry Lloyd was sacked. He left the job in July 1983.

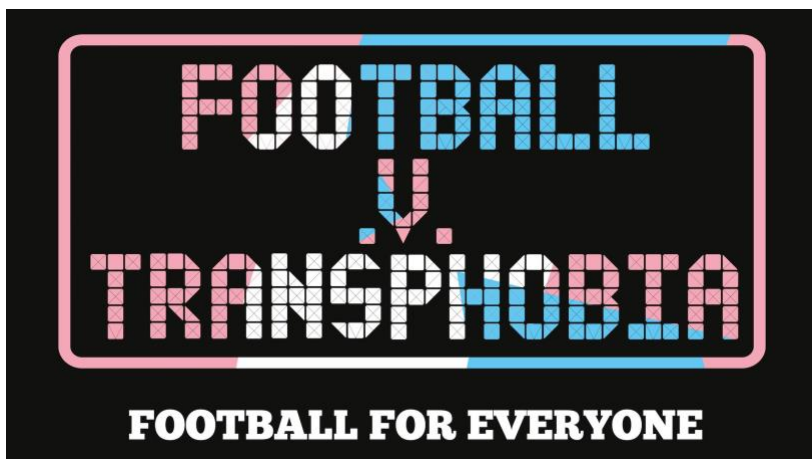
2018 - Ray Wilkins died at the age of 61. The Hillingdon born midfielder played for the likes of Chelsea, Manchester United, AC Milan, Rangers and QPR, and won 84 England caps, scoring 3 goals.

End Of Term Report 2025/26

The 2025/26 season unfolded as a turbulent, unpredictable journey, veering between exhilarating highs and bruising lows, and producing enough drama to keep supporters hooked from the opening day to the final whistle.

The campaign began with promise. A 2-1 win over Albion Sports, with goals from Luis Afonso Ferreira and Tom Alngohuro (pictured above), hinted at a side capable of grinding out results. But that early optimism was quickly tempered by narrow defeats and frustrating afternoons, as the team struggled to find consistency in the opening weeks.

The early fixtures set the tone for a season that never quite settled. A narrow FA Cup defeat at Brighouse Town and a 1-0 losses at Barton Town and Bottesford Town stalled momentum, though Luis AF's winner against Thackley lifted spirits. An early 5-1 FA Vase exit to Maghull gave the sense of early season instability. A 3-0 home defeat to Tadcaster Albion was a setback, but the composed 2-0 win at Penistone Church, when Destiny Ifeanyi Nnenanua and Luis AF struck in each half, was a day to savour.

September started with a creditable goalless draw with Liversedge was followed by a spirited 2-2 comeback at Parkgate, with Martyn Woolford and Tom A dragging us level after falling 2 goals behind. But the month took a downward turn with a 3-0 home defeat to Knaresborough Town, and heavy losses to Golcar United and Campion, exposed defensive vulnerabilities that would end the managerial reign of Tom Claisse and would haunt us a little throughout the season.

Club hero and senior player Martyn Woolford took over, initially in a caretaker capacity, and opened



his account with a narrow Sheffield Senior Cup win over SJR Workso, sealed by a Cody Collins thunderbolt. A 5-0 reverse at Sheffield was tempered by one of the season's most uplifting performances, a superb 4-1 win at Beverley Town. On that afternoon, Frickley were everything they had threatened to be - sharp and clinical - with goals from Tom A, Destiny, Lucas Robinson (pictured below) and Tyler Sheard.

The momentum didn't last long. A 3-0 home defeat at home to Handsworth opened the next run of league fixtures, but what followed was one of the most extraordinary matches in The Azzurri's modern history. In the NCEL League Cup against Bottesford Town, we found ourselves 5-1 down and seemingly out of the competition. What followed defied belief. a furious, relentless comeback that ended in a 7-6 victory, the highest scoring NCEL League Cup game of all time and one of the highest scoring games at The Wezzie ever. At the heart of it was Destiny

who provided the drive and Sam Cable who produced a sensational hat trick, including a late winner that completed the turnaround. It was the season's defining moment of spirit, chaos and sheer refusal to accept defeat.

The league form remained uneven. A 6-0 defeat at Golcar United was followed by a composed 2-0 win away at Wombwell Town, courtesy of Charlie Clegg and Robbo. Progression in the Sheffield Cup against Jubilee Sports preceded another decent league performance, as Shaun Heselwood, Destiny, Robbo and Cleggy all found the net in a 4-1 win over Rossington Main. But a goalless draw at Horbury Town and a 1-1 home draw with Pickering Town, where Tom A's opener was cancelled out by a stoppage

time penalty, slowed the momentum. The Sheffield Cup brought more drama, with a 2-2 draw against Rossington Main, after being 2 goals down, ending in a penalty shootout defeat. League form remained erratic as we fell to a 6-0

defeat at Knaresborough Town. But then a comfortable 2-0 win over a bogey side Golcar United in the League Cup, with Josh Lindley scoring twice, suggested the start of a resurgence.

So it proved as December delivered 10 points from a possible 12 from the beginning of the month, starting with the season's most emphatic performance. The Blues demolished Thackley 7-0 in a devastating attacking display, with Lucas Robinson scoring 4 times in a ruthless exhibition of finishing. For once everything seemed effortless. The Boys in Blue followed that with a 4-1 win at Albion Sports, a 2-1 home victory over Bottesford Town, and a hard-earned 1-1 draw at Tadcaster Albion.

After a surprise 3-2 defeat to Penistone Church in the last game of 2025, in front of almost 800 fans, the biggest crowd at Westfield Lane for many a year, the new year brought a harsh correction.

The weather disrupted the fixture list with several postponements, leaving us without a game for 4 weeks, then a pair of defeats to nil against Campion and Pickering closed out January. The Pickering game also marked our first game after Destiny departed to sign for Bridlington Town, a change to our play that we are possibly still recovering from.

A 3-0 League Cup exit to Liversedge in the first week of February was followed by a brief spark with a superb 2-1 win at Handsworth, where Joel Spence and Charlie Clegg hit a cracking pair of goals - our first of 2026.

But a run of 5 defeats from 6 stalled any potential recovery. A 3-1 win over Eccleshill United, with Robbo scoring 2 and Elliott Andrew converting a penalty, was the only bright spot.

A 2-0 Friday night home win over local rivals Wombwell Town, courtesy of Elliott Andrew's free kick and a Sam Cable goal, did restore some pride and more importantly probably ended our flirtation with relegation.

Robbo scored his 13th goal of the season in the

3-1 midweek loss to Sheffield, played in horrendous conditions. And last weekend, our last awayday of the season ended in a 4-0 collapse at Rossington Main.

There were 39 different players who made a first team appearance in 2025/26. And while everyone loves a goal scorer, here's a shoutout to those fellas who spent their time keeping 'em out rather than sticking them in, and haven't had a mention yet. Will Sykes, Spencer Booth, Harry Gagen (pictured), Tom Radley, Lewis Binns, Sam Kilner, Harry Carmody, Liam Love, Will Jenkinson, Niall Butchart, Harry Viggars, Takunda Katsere – we see you!



In the end, the 2025/26 season has been a story of volatility, resilience and unforgettable drama. We never quite found the sustained form needed to climb to the higher echelons the table, but we have produced enough extraordinary moments, from the 7-0 at Thackley to the 7-6 miracle against Bottesford, to ensure that supporters experienced a campaign unlike any other.

And a win in today's final game against Horbury would give us both our highest position and points total in our time in the NCEL. But the best cure for this season is always next season. We go again in 2026/27 - I can't wait!

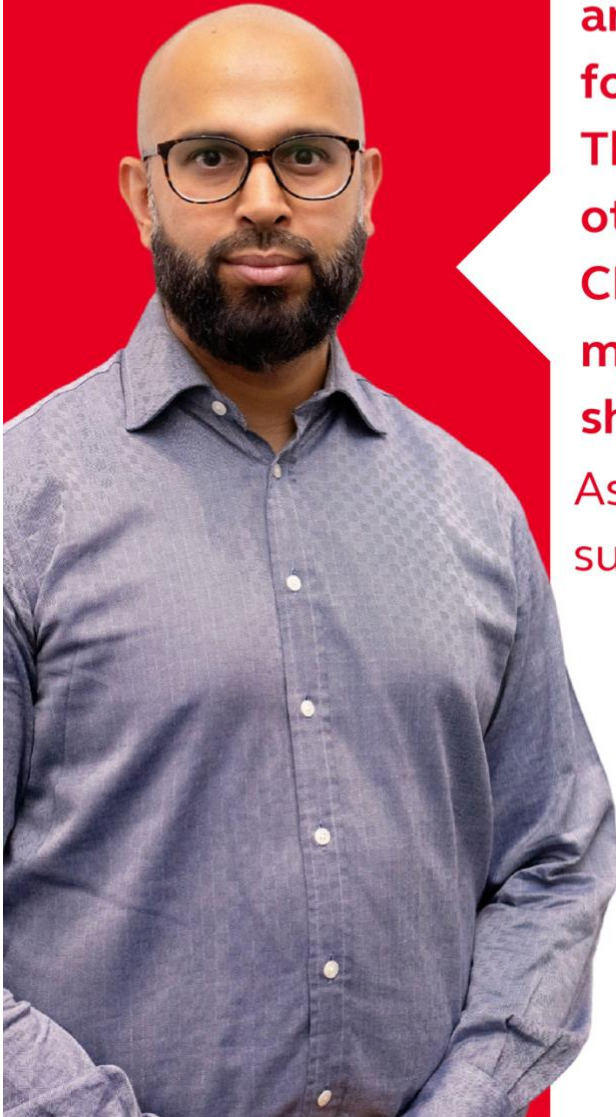
